1 (Exhibits A, B, and C were marked prior to the hearing.) 2 3 (The hearing began at 6:17 p.m. on 4 August 15th, 2013.) 5 6 MR. OSWALD: Okay. I'll now open the 7 second non-renewal hearing on the special 8 Safety and Licensing Committee agenda. This 9 is action item 13-1135, and it's a 10 non-renewal hearing for the operator's 11 license of Kyle D. Willenkamp, 2923 North 12 Peach Tree Lane. And, Mr. Willenkamp, you 13 heard from the last committee meeting we do 14 have a court reporter present, and you heard who all of us are up here, and who is seated 15 16 to our right. At this time then, I'd like to give 17 18 each side an opportunity to give an opening 19 statement. So I would have Lieutenant 20 Elliott open -- or Sergeant Probst open with 21 his opening statement. 22 SGT. PROBST: Thank you. The 23 Appleton Police Department will ask the 24 committee to recommend to the Common Council 25 that it not renew the operator's license

1 issued to Kyle D. Willenkamp. We ask for 2 such a recommendation as Mr. Willenkamp was 3 recently convicted of operating while intoxicated, third offense, and has had 4 5 prior convictions for the same in 2000 and 6 1996. Thank you. 7 Mr. Willenkamp, do you MR. OSWALD: 8 wish to make an opening statement? 9 MR. WILLENKAMP: No, that's okay. 10 MR. OSWALD: At this time then, I 11 would ask that the police department present 12 its case beginning with Officer Probst being 13 sworn in. 14 15 Said SERGEANT CHAD PROBST, having 16 been first duly sworn by me to testify the 17 truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth relative to said cause, testified as 18 19 follows: SGT. PROBST: 20 I do. 21 MR. OSWALD: And I'm sorry. Could 22 you state your name again and your position 23 with the Appleton Police Department. 24 SGT. PROBST: Sure. I'm Sergeant 25 Chad Probst with the Appleton Police

Department. I act as a co-liaison between the police department and the committee.

MR. OSWALD: Thank you. You can go ahead.

SGT. PROBST: All right. The first item that I'd like to present to you I marked as Exhibit A. It a certified driving record from the Division of Motor Vehicles for the State of Wisconsin. I'd ask that you first look at what's marked as page 2 of 4. At the bottom you see a highlighted area in the middle of the page showing a violation date of 06/08/2012, conviction date of 10/23 of 2012 for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated. That was Mr. Willenkamp's third offense.

Next on page 3 of 4 towards the top, again you'll see a highlighted area, showing a violation date of 09/29/1999, and a conviction date of 11/24/2000, again for operating a vehicle while intoxicated, that was second offense. And then finally on the bottom of page 3 of 4, another highlighted area, operating while intoxicated as a third offense, violation date of 12/28/1995, and a

conviction of 2/6/1996.

Next item I'd like you to look at I have marked as Exhibit B. Exhibit B is a Judgment of Conviction for the second prior offense or the number two offense. see a date of the crime committed was 09/29/1999, and a conviction date of February 17th, 2000. I just want to point out that there is a difference in the date on the Judgment of Conviction versus what the Certified Driving Record shows. It's my understanding that that's as a result of an appeal that Mr. Willenkamp filed with the So the DOT record is showing a conviction date at the end of the appellate period, and that the Judgment of Conviction is showing the date that he was convicted in Outagamie County Court. Okay.

So next we'll move on to Exhibit C and that is the Judgment of Conviction for the most recent OWI offense, and see the date of the crime committed was 06/08/2012, and the date of conviction is 10/22 of 2012.

I'd like to talk for just a moment about the incident in question. It was the

arrest which occurred on June 28, 2012. 0n that date our officers were essentially dispatched to the parking lot at St. Joe's Church at the corner of Lawrence and Walnut Street in the City of Appleton at approximately 1:45 a.m. The concerned citizen called the police department after observing a citizen, which was later determined to be Mr. Willenkamp, walking, or in the words of the concerned citizen stumbling, toward a vehicle and had concerns about his physical condition and his ability to drive, based on the fact that the reporting person felt that he was far too intoxicated to do so. Our officers eventually did make contact with Mr. Willenkamp after he drove away, and did a traffic stop on him at East Glendale Avenue and Meade Street in the City of Our officers did determine Mr. Willenkamp was intoxicated and administered standard field sobriety tests, which he performed poorly and ultimately did make arrest and processed him just as any other, and the blood result ultimately

1	returned at .316. The legal limit again is
2	. 08.
3	The final point of evidence I want to
4	discuss is the application that
5	Mr. Willenkamp completed filing for renewal.
6	He did list the most recent conviction for
7	OWI late last year, but did not list any of
8	the other convictions. That's all I have.
9	MR. OSWALD: Thank you.
10	Mr. Willenkamp, is there any questions that
11	you have for the Appleton police at this
12	time?
13	MR. WILLENKAMP: No, sir, I do not.
14	MR. OSWALD: Thank you. Then I'd
15	open it up to this committee to ask any
16	questions to Sergeant Probst. I would ask,
17	are you aware of whether or not Mr.
18	Willenkamp is on active parole or probation?
19	SGT. PROBST: He is not.
20	MR. OSWALD: And does he have his
21	driver's license, do you know?
22	SGT. PROBST: He's revoked right now
23	for the OWI offenses.
24	MR. OSWALD: Okay. Alderperson
25	Smith.

1 MR. SMITH: Hopefully this is not too 2 far afield, but he was observed at St. Joe's 3 -- middle school or church? SGT. PROBST: St. Joe's Church. 4 5 MR. SMITH: And he got stopped at 6 Meade and East Glendale. 7 SGT. PROBST: Correct. 8 MR. OSWALD: Is there anything on the 9 report that indicates that kind of a 10 distance before he was stopped? I mean, 11 this seems like a long way to drive to 12 specifically look for him and get that far. 13 SGT. PROBST: The report did indicate 14 that the officers were eventually able to 15 catch up in that time and make the traffic 16 stop when they were able to get in contact 17 with, at that time, the suspect vehicle, and the reporting person was following and was 18 19 continually on telephone contact with our 20 dispatchers. 21 MR. SMITH: Okav. Thank you for the 22 clarification. MR. OSWALD: Last question I'd have 23 24 is: Sergeant Probst, are you aware of how 25 long Mr. Willenkamp has possessed an

1 Appleton operator's license? 2 SGT. PROBST: He's had a license 3 continually since 2006. 4 MR. OSWALD: Thank you. 5 Mr. Willenkamp, you've seen the exhibits 6 that Sergeant Probst presented to us. 7 you have any objection to those exhibits? 8 MR. WILLENKAMP: No, I do not, sir. 9 MR. OSWALD: Okay. At this time 10 then, Mr. Willenkamp, this is your 11 opportunity to present your case. 12 MR. WILLENKAMP: First of all, thank 13 you for your time. 14 (Brief discussion off the record.) 15 MR. WILLENKAMP: Okay. Again, thank 16 you for your time. I don't deny the 17 evidence just stated there. Just a little bit of a background. I'm an Appleton 18 19 resident, married, with a son, been employed 20 with the Volcrow Incorporated (phonetic 21 spelling), which is The Bar on the Avenue, since approximately April of 2002. 22 23 opened in July of 2002. I actually became a 24 co-owner of the business in June of 2007. 25 As they stated, I've had a bartender's

license for that entire time.

I don't deny anything with what happened with my DUI. It wasn't on a night that I was working. I guess my reason for being here is I do not drink while working. I have not since I became an owner in 2007. And part of my big responsibility is I basically close every Friday and Saturday evening, which is our busy times.

I'm kind of the direct person that would deal with the Appleton Police Department with any troublesome customers, things of that nature. Often I am the final call on cutting someone off. So my responsibility level when I'm at work as far as dealing with alcohol and patrons with alcohol -- I think it is excellent, which is why my partners trusted me to become their partner and to oversee that aspect of the business during our busy times.

Certainly what I did showed lack of judgement, extremely dangerous, and I could have hurt someone or myself what I did that night. And since then, you know, I did serve some jail time, five days in lockup

1 and some time on a GPS. I've been sober since July 31st of 2012, part of that time 2 3 would be before I ever was convicted, some 4 of that may be knowledge -- I'm currently in 5 the SSTOP program, which is somewhat similar 6 to probation, where I have to meet with 7 someone for -- once a month, and I have some 8 community service I'm completing and things 9 of that nature. 10 So, you know, I'd like to think I'm a 11 good member of the community, and have been 12 for quite some time. I did make a mistake 13

So, you know, I'd like to think I'm a good member of the community, and have been for quite some time. I did make a mistake that night. I don't think what I did, you know, is going to restrict me on continuing to do what I do for my business and, you know, working, I think, well with the Appleton Police Department in, you know, deterring over-intoxication, underage, problem patrons, things of that nature. Thank you.

MR. OSWALD: Does the police department have any questions for Mr. Willenkamp?

SGT. PROBST: I only have two.

Mr. Willenkamp, did you receive a copy of

1	the criminal complaint?
2	MR. WILLENKAMP: Yes, I did.
3	SGT. PROBST: Do you feel the facts
4	contained within it are accurate?
5	MR. WILLENKAMP: Yes, I did.
6	MR. OSWALD: Thank you. And I'd open
7	it up to this committee for questions to
8	Mr. Willenkamp. Alderman Smith.
9	MR. SMITH: Thank you.
10	Mr. Willenkamp, I just want to make sure
11	and correct me. You said you have not drank
12	at the bar since you became partner, and
13	that was when?
14	MR. WILLENKAMP: June of 2007.
15	MR. SMITH: Okay.
16	MR. WILLENKAMP: I'm sorry. To
17	clarify, did I drink there during my off
18	times, yes. As far as when I'm actually
19	there in a working capacity, I did not.
20	MR. SMITH: All right. And my
21	question is then the second question is
22	you were observed at St. Joe's, which is
23	right next door to the bar. Were you coming
24	from the bar that evening that you got
25	nicked up in 20122

1	MR. WILLENKAMP: No, I was not coming
2	from that bar. I was coming from an
3	different establishment down the street.
4	MR. SMITH: Okay. Thank you.
5	MR. OSWALD: Could you describe a
6	little more the SSTOP program and what that
7	entails? Are you subject to urinalysis?
8	MR. WILLENKAMP: Yes, I am.
9	MR. OSWALD: And is it a social
10	worker, is it a nurse, who's overseeing your
11	compliance with that?
12	MR. WILLENKAMP: It's I think it's
13	called volunteer offenders' services, I
14	think is the name of it. It's right the
15	old Chamber of Commerce building.
16	MR. OSWALD: Yes.
17	MR. WILLENKAMP: Yes. And Jennifer
18	Deterts (phonetic spelling) would be my
19	supervisor.
20	MR. OSWALD: And can you explain what
21	did you was that court mandated? Was
22	it part of your sentencing?
23	MR. WILLENKAMP: It is essentially
24	for second and third DUI convictions.
25	Instead of having to sit and do my full

sentence of 130 days, I had to do five
essentially in lockup and then 40 on the
Global Positioning Bracelet. Which 45 days,
I believe, is the minimum time for a third
conviction. So it essentially gives you
less jail time, but you're under that
supervision, you know, absolute sobriety for
a year.
MR. OSWALD: Okay. Alderperson Garb.
MS. GARB: I have a couple questions.
Am I right, you said you've been sober since
July 31st of 2012?
MR. WILLENKAMP: That's correct.
Yes.
MS. GARB: So over a year?
MR. WILLENKAMP: Mm-hmm.
MS. GARB: A blood alcohol content of
.316, quite frankly, is extremely concerning.
I'm wondering if you can talk about did
you think you were drunk? Did you decide
you think you were drunk? Did you decide
you
you MR. WILLENKAMP: Yes, I knew I was

1 using this as an excuse --2 MS. GARB: No. 3 MR. WILLENKAMP: -- but that level of 4 intoxication -- and, you know, I was a 5 frequent drinker, you know, before this --6 was very, very high even for myself being a 7 frequent drinker. I had been out that night 8 and was celebrating by first hole-in-one in 9 golf, and a lot of people were buying me 10 shots, and I really basically lost control. 11 Okay. Thank you. MS. GARB: I'm 12 also -- you have -- that's not your only one 13 obviously. 14 MR. WILLENKAMP: Correct. 15 MS. GARB: You they're over guite a 16 wide time span. Can you -- were you kind of 17 a habitual drinker, or can you kind of explain -- you know, you talked about this 18 19 night as a mistake, but I'm wondering, you 20 know, we have two other nights to kind of 21 look at. My first 22 MR. WILLENKAMP: Sure. 23 conviction I was only 17 years old. 24 21 on my second, and I certainly did go

through a period where I think my drinking

1	was kind of a problem in my probably early
2	to mid 20s. I think it was kind of really
3	wanting to go forward in my business,
4	settling down with somebody, eventually
5	getting married, and my son, where you
6	know, I feel that my drinking was under
7	control.
8	You know, I wasn't habitually
9	drinking and driving, but that night, again
10	you know, I wish I could explain what
11	went through my mind, but I don't even know
12	what knowing the condition in the back of
13	my head of what I was in to get behind the
14	wheel was a terrible, terrible mistake.
15	MS. GARB: Thank you.
16	MR. OSWALD: Alderman Smith.
17	MR. SMITH: Thank you. I just want
18	to go back. You're still under the SSTOP
19	program?
20	MR. WILLENKAMP: Correct. I'm not
21	positive the date, but it might be October.
22	It might coincide with my conviction date.
23	MR. SMITH: And part of that
24	maintain complete sobriety, correct?
25	MR. WILLENKAMP: Correct.

1	MR. SMITH: I think as one of our
2	fine police officers from Winnebago recited
3	the SSTOP program, so I'm just trying to
4	recall all of the things on there. But
5	so it's hard so for this committee to
6	determine if this is a change in life or
7	complying with the program you're under, is
8	the level we have to deal with.
9	MR. WILLENKAMP: Mm-hmm.
10	MR. SMITH: All right. Thank you.
11	MS. GARB: Can you respond to that?
12	MR. SMITH: I thought I gave him an
13	opportunity.
14	MR. OSWALD: Do you wish to respond
15	to that?
16	MR. WILLENKAMP: Can you repeat that
17	for me then, sir?
18	MR. SMITH: Well, I'm just saying,
19	you're under the program with SSTOP, so you
20	need to maintain complete sobriety while
21	you're still under that program. So my
22	question was, if the program was not in play
23	at this point in time, would you be
24	celebrating your next hole-in-one?
25	MR. WILLENKAMP: Okay. Sorry, I

1 didn't understand that at first. 2 reality is I spoke with my wife quite a few 3 times of, you know, I'm not going to drink Honestly, I really haven't had any 4 again. 5 troubles in my life other than drinking and 6 driving. And right now at this point, I 7 don't think that I am going to drink again. 8 I'm not going to sit here and say that with 9 100 percent certainty that I never will. 10 The realty I look at is that if I were to 11 get in trouble with alcohol again, it would 12 probably literally unravel my life. 13 know, I don't know how my partners would 14 feel about something like that happening 15 I certainly can't imagine, you know, 16 my wife -- putting her through that. 17 know, I missed holidays, I missed her graduation from college, because of the most 18 19 recent thing. And so for me, looking at it 20 from the point of just drinking and driving, 21 if I were to ever drink again, it absolutely 22 doesn't matter if one drop, there's never 23 ever behind the wheel for the rest of my

life.

MR. SMITH: I'd like to respond to

that.

MR. OSWALD: Alderperson Smith.

MR. SMITH: I have one more question as a follow up: You're part owner of the bar, so you have a management and a role model that you have to put out there for your employees and your guests. So a pretty bad opportunity you showed them a year ago. What have you been doing since?

MR. WILLENKAMP: There was a lot of humiliation there. There was comments made, you know, aren't you the one always yelling at me not to do this, and then you did it.

So since that time, you know, I've taken steps even further of, you know, whether it be employees that got done early and went out for a while, or if it's customers -- just be extra vigilant and point to myself, you don't want to go through this, you don't want to deal with what I dealt with, you know, it's not fun, it affects every aspect of your life. And just really kind of being a role model of, I went through it, don't be like me, you know, do the right thing.

Well, I can't right now, but I used
to be the one, hey, I'll give you a ride,
don't drive. And then during some time off,
on a night off, I go do it. So there was
definitely humiliation.
MR. SMITH: Okay. Thank you.
MR. OSWALD: If there's nothing
further from the committee, you have no
exhibits or evidence to submit to the
committee?
MR. WILLENKAMP: No, I do not.
MR. OSWALD: Then I would ask if the
Appleton police have anything in response to
what Mr. Willenkamp stated.
SGT. PROBST: I don't.
MR. OSWALD: Okay.
(Brief discussion off the record.)
MR. OSWALD: Alderman Garb.
MS. GARB: Are you licensed anywhere
else?
MR. WILLENKAMP: No, I'm not. Just
Appleton.
MR. OSWALD: Okay. If there's
nothing further from this committee in the
form of questions, I'd ask the Appleton

Police to present their closing statements.

SGT. PROBST: Thank you. We expect our licensed bartenders to adhere to all state laws and local ordinances.

Mr. Willenkamp has not. Our city bartenders are also expected to exhibit a high level of responsibility and awareness to the effects of alcohol intoxication. They are personally responsible for maintaining and contributing to the safety of our community. The common public safety risk through repeated drunk driving is unacceptable, especially for one who holds a City of

Appleton bartender's license.

Mr. Willenkamp's most recent arrest demonstrates poor judgement and irresponsibility that put the community-at-large and at risk and did so at an extremely high level of intoxication.

This is not just a close call, he was not just barely over .08, he was maybe four times the legal limit. This is an egregious violation that demonstrates that

Mr. Willenkamp cannot be entrusted with the responsibility that comes with holding an

Appleton bartender's license. If

Mr. Willenkamp is going to be drinking
himself to that level of intoxication and
get behind the wheel, we cannot expect him
to act responsibly when it comes to serving
and over-serving in his place of employment.

The bottom line is that

Mr. Willenkamp has engaged in illegal and
dangerous conduct in the same sphere that he
holds a bartender's license. It also
demonstrated that he does not possess the
qualifications required in Chapter 125 of
the Wisconsin statute to hold said license.

In light of the seriousness and recency of these violations, the Appleton Police Department is asking this committee to not renew Mr. Willenkamp's operator's license.

MR. OSWALD: Thank you, Sergeant Probst. And, Mr. Willenkamp, it's an opportunity for a closing statement.

MR. WILLENKAMP: I guess just to reiterate what I said earlier. You know, I've been doing this since 2002, and in the role I'm in -- it isn't going to change the

1 role I'm in. As you stated before, I 2 require all my bartenders to have a license, 3 you know, there would always be somebody there that has one, but the principal of it 4 is the owner not having one because of what 5 6 I did, and me telling them that they have to 7 But I feel that my responsibility have one. 8 at work has been shown through the past 12 9 years or 11 years that we've been open at 10 That, you know, I haven't had any 11 problems related to when I'm in charge of my 12 business, which is particularly what would 13 pertain to a bartender's license. And I 14 thank you for your time. 15 MR. OSWALD: Thank you. And at this 16 time I would -- we have one question from 17 Alderperson Garb. MS. GARB: How I do -- how would you 18 19 -- what relevance, if any, would you give to 20 his year's sobriety? 21 SGT. PROBST: I'm sorry? 22 MS. GARB: You talked about his offenses, which we understand, but I'm 23

wondering if you think that the year of

sobriety has any bearing on our evaluation?

1	SGT. PROBST: I look at the
2	violations.
3	MS. GARB: Okay.
4	SGT. PROBST: I can't personally put
5	my opinion into my determination of what's
6	valid. I look at the violations that are
7	faced in front of me and, you know, the
8	three OWIs that he was that he committed
9	and was convicted of.
10	MS. GARB: All right. Thank you.
11	MR. OSWALD: Okay. Thank you. At
12	this time I'd entertain a motion for the
13	Special Safety and Licensing Committee to go
14	into closed session pursuant to state
15	statute 19.85 sub 1 sub A, to discuss the
16	non-renewal of Kyle Willenkamp's operator's
17	license, and then reconvene into open
18	session.
19	MR. SMITH: So moved.
20	MS. GARB: Second.
21	MR. OSWALD: Motion by Alderperson
22	Smith and a second by Alderperson Garb. All
23	those in favor state by saying aye. Aye.
24	MR. SMITH: Aye.
25	MS. GARB: Aye.

1	MR. OSWALD: We are in closed
2	session.
3	(Committee in closed session.)
4	MR. OSWALD: At this time I'd
5	entertain a motion to rise and report.
6	MS. GARB: Move to rise and report.
7	MR. SMITH: Second.
8	MR. OSWALD: Motion by Alderperson
9	Garb and a second by Alderperson Smith to
10	rise and report and reconvene into open
11	session. All those is favor state by saying
12	aye. Aye.
13	MR. SMITH: Aye.
14	MS. GARB: Aye.
15	MR. OSWALD: Meeting is re-adjourned
16	reconvened. And at this time the Safety
17	and Licensing Committee for the City of
18	Appleton does hereby make the following
19	findings of fact, conclusions of law, and
20	recommendations to the Common Council in the
21	matter of Appleton Police Department versus
22	Kyle D. Willenkamp.
23	Finding of fact number one: The
24	respondent, Kyle D. Willenkamp, was
25	convicted on October 23rd of 2012 of

1	operating while intoxicated, third offense,
2	for an incident which occurred in the City
3	of Appleton on June 8th, 2012.
4	Two: The respondent, Kyle D.
5	Willenkamp previously had been convicted of
6	operating while intoxicated, second offense,
7	on November 24th, 2000, in Outagamie County,
8	and operating while intoxicated, first
9	offense, on February 6th, 1996, in the
10	Village of Kimberly.
11	And I'd entertain a motion on the
12	findings of fact as stated.
13	MR. SMITH: So moved.
14	MS. GARB: Motion to approve.
15	MR. OSWALD: Motion to approve by
16	Alderperson Smith, and a second by
17	Alderperson Garb. All those in favor state
18	by saying aye. Aye.
19	MR. SMITH: Aye.
20	MS. GARB: Aye.
21	MR. OSWALD: Those finding of fact
22	are recommended three to zero as an approval
23	to the Common Council.
24	Next, we have the conclusions of law.
25	First, the conviction for operating while

1 intoxicated, third offense, is substantially 2 related to the subject matter of the 3 license. Second, the pattern of convictions 4 are substantially related to the 5 respondent's ability to responsibly hold an 6 operator's license issued pursuant to 7 Appleton ordinance 9-75 sub A sub 8, and 8 Wisconsin statute 125.17. Third, as a 9 result of these convictions, the respondent 10 does not possess the requisite 11 qualifications to hold an operator's license 12 pursuant to the requirements of Wisconsin 13 State statute 125.12, sub 2 sub AG sub 4, 14 and Wisconsin statue 125.04 sub 5 sub A sub 15 1 and B. 16 And I'd entertain a motion on those conclusions of law as stated. 17 18 MR. SMITH: Move to approve. 19 MS. GARB: Second. 20 Motion by Alderperson MR. OSWALD: 21 Smith and a second by Alderperson Garb to 22 approve those conclusions of law as stated. 23 All those in favor state by saying aye. 24 Aye.

MR. SMITH:

MS. GARB: Aye.

MR. OSWALD: Vote is three to zero to recommend that the Common Council approve those conclusions of law.

And with those conclusions of fact -or findings of fact and conclusions of law
voted on, I would now entertain a motion to
approve or deny the application for renewal
