Behavioral History, Evaluation and Recommendations for "Snap" Verner

Date: 6-15-19

Veterinarian and phone #: Crossroads Vet Clinic, Dr. Kumbalek, (920) 749-9400

Date of most recent vet visit: Last seen June 5th 2019 to have stitches from ear/face area removed. December 2018 for annual wellness exam. Owners have a letter from the clinic attesting to Snap's appropriate behavior in the clinic and towards staff.

Known health problems/medical history: Luxating patella repaired at Animal Referral Center Sept 2016 (cost owners approx. \$3,000), since then there has been no evidence of pain or discomfort.

Where did you obtain your pet?: New Pawsibilities in Oshkosh, WI – early history relatively unknown - had been from Kentucky, found malnourished, with mange (contagious skin disease) and had had puppies.

DOB: Guessing Spring 2013

Age when acquired: About 1-1.5 year old

Owners describe pet's personality: Sweet, affectionate, loves people, happy, loyal, trustworthy while left home alone, doesn't have accidents in the house, loves car rides, tolerates storms/fireworks, dislikes mower/stays away from mower, dislikes the cold and rain.

Food Brand and Feeding Schedule: Taste of the Wild and ¼ can Evolve wet food daily (high quality dog food) – she's a good eater, motivated by food, and hasn't shown signs of guarding/possessiveness towards humans over food/water/bones.

Exercise frequency/routine: Exercise - within two fenced areas of the property or an occasional walk (but varies on weather – she dislikes cold and rain). The city has instructed owners to muzzle her if they are out walking or refrain from walking.

Other pets in household: Jedi – 14 year old, male cat – Snap and Jedi get along well and cohabitate well together.

Where does the pet sleep at night?: In bed with Jeff

Do you confine your pet? Where? When?: She used to be crated but is now loose in the house when owners are absent from the home. She's trustworthy, doesn't chew, destroy anything or have accidents. Jedi and Snap get along while owners are away from home too!

Formal Training: No formal classes

Collar/Leash type: Jeff – walks with body harness and retractable leash, Chrissy – walks with Gentle Leader and nylon leash. Overall, she walks well (no regular pulling or difficulty controlling).

Favorite reward: Food treats

Cues/Commands pet is familiar with: Sit, wait, shake, hi5, roll over, leave it, "no", doesn't beg/lays on floor while owners eat.

Other notes:

- Jeff's job is somewhat flexible.
- If owners travel, they'd typically take Snap with them.
- Owners have guests occasionally to the home and have never worried about or questioned how Snap would interact with anyone.
- Jeff and Chrissy are contesting Snap's "Dangerous Dog" designation with the Appleton Board of Health July 10th 2019. The police and city attorney will be present as well. When asked how many "Dangerous Dog's" exist in the city, Jeff was told only 5-6 dogs.
- If the "Dangerous Dog" designation is withheld - the city is requiring 1) Jeff and Chrissy to take out a 1 million dollar liability policy for Snap – amounting to \$3-5K/year for owners to get coverage. The insurance company Jeff called, had never quoted a 1 million dollar liability policy before 2) Snap to be relocated/rehomed outside city limits with new owners being made aware of the "Dangerous Dog" designation 3) Euthanasia.

Direct Behavior Assessment (completed by Kirstin with Beyond Obedience, LLC):

- **Initial Greeting:** Friendly, confident/non-fearful, jumped up once or twice but listened to owners to get down/off, eager to interact, mid-level wagging tail, calmed quickly and laid down after first few minutes of Kirstin being in the home. She allowed Kirstin to shake hands with both owner without showing any discomfort or insecurities with a new stranger interacting with her owners.
- **Petting/Handling:** Loves being close, buries head in Kirstin's lap, leans in for more scratches, permits tail, feet and ear handling. Loose, wiggling body and tail. Doesn't show sensitivity in being touched around ear/face area that had previously been injured in dog fight.
- **Complying with basic command from stranger:** Snap was anxious to get attention from Kirstin and would follow a basic command like "sit" prior to Kirstin agreeing to engage. Respectful when told to "get off"/body blocked from jumping-up.

- **Eye Contact:** Makes and holds eye contact with stranger, soft eyes, eager to work and please, looks to owners for interactions/attention/treats often.
- **Reaction to feeding:** Eager to eat kibble food, allows Kirstin to remove bowl and replace with more food – no signs of growling, freezing, body tension, lip quiver etc. Loose body and tail despite some pressure from Kirstin during four small bowl refills.
- **Reaction to removing other valued resource:** Kirstin offered a food stuffed kong to Snap. She allowed Kirstin to remove the item and was eager to re-engage with the kong when it was replaced. She walked away with the kong to be able to engage with it without being disturbed but showed no body tension, growling, freezing etc.
- **Introduction to an artificial dog:** Initially Kirstin placed an artificial German Shorthair in the fenced lot adjacent to the driveway, without Snap seeing. Owners then escorted Snap to the fenced area, we closed/locked the gate and dropped the leash to observe Snap's response. Upon seeing the stuffed dog, Snap immediately froze. Her front hackles gradually started to raise (piloerection). She stayed very still for several seconds and just watched. Eventually, the remaining hackles began to rise and she moved very slowly to position herself behind Jeff. There she began a low growl, her body became stiffer and her head lowered. She displayed a definitive "*defensive response*" (reaction based on fear). When Kirstin and Jeff proceeded to approach the stuffed dog, she became a bit more interested but also approached with some hesitation (body low to ground, slow movements, head down etc.). Upon coming up to the dog she immediately went straight to the rear of the dog to sniff. Her movement was slow and stiff but appropriate and non-invasive. The exchange obviously evoked hesitation and fear from Snap. Kirstin did not observe a confident, dog-social-dog -- but instead one that likely possesses some social deficits and uncertainties with other dogs.
- **General Observations:** Snap loves to play and run (darts playfully around yard) but also settles well in the home too. She essentially ignores Jedi unless he's up on Jeff's shoulders and then she becomes a bit agitated for attention herself. Snap often got up to engage with owners or Kirstin for treats or attention but was also content resting during our appointment while we chatted.

History:

- **Prior to 5/26/19 Snap had never shown any aggression or roughness towards any human.**
- For several years (2014-2019), Snap cohabitated with owner's other dog, "Grommet", until he passed. Upon first meeting one another, Snap was aloof to Grommet. The two occasionally had squabbles around valued resources like bones and food but there was never any physical damage inflicted to either dog.
- "Beauty" and "Beast" - Bulldogs next door have interacted positively with Snap a couple of times.
- During a daycare assessment at Clever K9's 6/27/14 – two months after first acquiring Snap – Staff noted that she needed some work with allowing handling/going in and out of her suite and playing with other dogs – they did not reject her from staying at their facility or fail her in her evaluation -- but suggested she come on quieter days.
- Chrissy's sister has a male Jack Russel (Pippen) who is very food possessive. July 2014 while all at a family cabin together, the dogs got into a squabble over food -- but neither

dog was injured. Owners then removed valued resources and the dogs cohabitated fine the rest of the weekend without issue.

- Snap has a perch/seat near the side window of the home and will watch outside as people/dogs pass on the sidewalk. She will begin to bark if she sees a passing dog (a common issue for many dogs) but will cease the behavior if owners ask for her to stop and threaten use of water bottle spritz.
- Snap has spent time around at least 6 children in the neighborhood and within the extended family (ages 2+). There have never been any issues with children.
- Over the years, Snap has visited Jeff and Chrissy's workplaces and interacted with a number of co-workers without issue.
- Owners have observed the second dog (from Episode #2, a Shepherd Mix) involved in the 5/26/19 incident on walks with it's owner. They report seeing it bark and lunge towards passing dogs in the past. They had heard its owners are also working with another trainer to address their behavior concerns with their own dog but have no idea who they are working with or the type of training approach being used?
- While walking Snap on leash, owners have observed that Snap often has NO response to some passing dogs. If the other dog is responding (barking/lunging) towards her, she may bark or pull but owners are able to control her, have her sit and get her focused onto them. She doesn't usually start any provocation, but she's reacted if the other dog acts out first. Owners don't recall ever being in a position where they felt she's been out of control or unmanageable on walks or around other dogs.
- **Episode #1** (last spring/summer 2018): A copy of the actual report/citation would be recommended here. Snap was in the large gated area around lunchtime. Jeff went to grab her and return her to the house. He had entered the gated area but the gate was ajar as he was attempting to leash Snap. Snap ended up darting free between his legs and through the open gate and up the street. Jeff had noticed a neighbor walking his dog (Bella) west on the opposite side of the street and wondered if Snap might've approached them. Jeff ran inside to grab his keys and drove down the block to find Snap browsing around a rummage sale table at 430 E. Spring Street. Jeff opened the car door and Snap jumped in. No one from the property appeared to be around to talk to. Neighbor and Bella were across the street by then (neighbor holding Bella in his arms) and Jeff asked if anything had happened? Bella's owner indicated that Snap did not bother them but that she had chased a small white dog into the open front door of 430 E. Spring St. Jeff took Snap back home and ended up going back to work. After work, he found an orange notice on the door asking Jeff to contact police. Jeff complied. The investigating officer visited Jeff and reported that he was being cited with having a "Dog at Large" and a "License Violation Warning". The officer explained that no person, pet or property had been harmed and no other citation was necessary. Two days later, however, the officer's supervisor had the original officer call back and explain that the citation "Molesting a Passerby or Vehicle" was being added so there would be three fines to pay.
- **Episode #2** (5/26/19, 1:30pm): Jeff and Snap were BBQing in the fenced area adjacent to the home. The shorter, black gate, was unknowingly left ajar enough that Snap could squeeze through. When Jeff realized she'd escaped, he darted around the front of the house. At that point, he saw Snap and the second dog (a Shepherd mix) both standing and a fight was already ensuing in their front yard. Jeff did not observe who started it, but did not see Snap pinning or standing over the other dog – both dogs were upright. *The fight*

Professional installation and training service recommended. Example: Consider a layout with a double gate system and locks. Ideally, a gate should be positioned so Snap enters the gated area (adjacent to the house). This means, installing the gate on the opposite side of the back door.

- Formulate a new plan for increased exercise – a dog that doesn't receive enough exercise, variety and stimulation will be more prone to escaping/roaming as a means to entertain and expend energy. We need to be able to walk/run her and the yard will not be sufficient for this in and of itself. Seek out quieter neighborhoods, industrial park parking lots, cemeteries etc. Bring high-value treats with you for redirection and focus. Toss a handful of treats out to any approaching stray or unknown dog.
- Acclimate Snap to a basket muzzle that will allow her to pant and take treats. Remember, however, if she'd be approached by an unexpected aggressive dog, she would not be able to protect herself, So, this approach could present risk to her. - Block visual vantage points in the bay window with a frosted window cling to prevent patrolling and barking – even when you aren't home. Use the Through a Dog's Ear CD to promote relaxation and drowned out noises that could trigger barking.
- Preference: walking Snap on a Gentle Leader (possible pair with a Martingale collar and linked to Gentle Leader with coupler?) and nylon leash – equipment that promotes the most control. Bring high-value treats (chicken, cheese, hotdog etc – bits the size of pencil eraser) with on every outing for redirection and attention but also to toss out to any oncoming stray/loose dogs.

Overall Conclusions and Considerations:

Snap has no previous history of aggression towards humans, familiar or unfamiliar. She is friendly, happy, loves contact with people of all ages/genders etc. She cohabitates well with cat, Jedi, and has interacted with several other dogs as well. She may possess some resource guarding issues when other dogs are present (a common canine issue) and displays some insecurities and hesitations around other unknown dogs (also common). This suggests some weakness in the area of dog-dog social skills but could be addressed.

Based on observations shared from 5/26/19, it's hard to tell which of the two dogs officially started the fight. Technically, Snap was still on her property when she encountered the Shepherd being walked in front of her home. There is also some evidence that the Shepherd had been observed previously lunging/barking/reacting toward other dogs on it's walks - so the Shepherd may have some dog-dog reactivity or on-leash related issues and could have been the instigator of the fight.

In Episode #2, the Shepherd was the dog to inflict harm to Snap and still did not receive any damage or injury from Snap in return. The Shepherd also latched on and wouldn't let go for a prolonged period of time – inflicting severe pain and damage. Once it finally released its bite, Snap did not show signs of wanting to pursue or retaliate. I am much more concerned about the extent and nature of the Shepherd's aggression than Snap's response to being on the receiving end of the aggression.

As a canine behavior professional, I do feel the bite to Jeff's arm in Episode #2 was, in fact, **provoked and justified considering the circumstance!** Certified dog trainers do not lump all cases of aggression into one category – instead, we classify types of aggression based on motivation and function. The bite to Jeff's arm was inflicted as a result of "Pain-Elicited,

escalated quickly with the Shepherd mix biting and adhering itself to the left side of Snap's face and ear. The dog would not let go despite being prompted (pulling on leash) by it's owner. There were several witnesses to the event. When Jeff realized that the Shepherd was not releasing and he heard Snap screaming, he knelt down to try and get a grip on her to help pull her away and unlatch the jaws of the other dog. With the Shepherd still attached to her face/ear, Snap directed a single bite to Jeff's right forearm and immediately released. Somehow, the Shepherd next released its grip from Snap's face/ear too. Jeff does not recall how this was ultimately accomplished but knows that the man then left with his dog. He remembers scooping up Snap, who did not show signs of pursuing the other dog in retaliation, and showed no resistance as Jeff brought her inside. Jeff's arm needed medical attention. The incident was reported at the hospital and Jeff received 5 stitches to the Level 3-4 bite wound. Snap was later seen and treated at the Animal Referral Center. The bites Snap received from the Shepherd were likely Level 4 bites. Owners should get copies of full records from Snap's care at the Referral Center and follow-up work done at Crossroads. Officer Pullen talked to Jeff at the hospital and gathered an account of the incident. Later that night, after collecting other witness statements, Pullen visited Jeff's home, met Snap (while leashed), and took pictures of her injuries. No canine temperament evaluation or history was ever gathered. Officer Pullen did state, however, that the Shepherd had received no injuries from Snap. Officer Fillebrown later issued a citation that was given to Jeff and Chrissy for "Attack Without Provocation", has deemed Snap a "Dangerous Dog" and has mapped out the options for Jeff and Chrissy going forward. Jeff and Chrissy plan to contest the "Dangerous Dog" designation on July 10th 2019 with the Board of Health. Please also see explanation below.

- After Episode #2, owners discovered there had been a mistake with the citations given a year ago. Instead of documenting the episodes as one occurrence, they'd incorrectly documented them as 2 separate events, incorrectly making the episode (5/26/19) Snap's third offense. Jeff believes he's now worked to resolve this mistake with authorities and Snap's record.

Recommendations:

- Seek statements from any/all caregivers and those having repeated or regular contact with Snap (groomer, daycare, neighbors, dog owners of dogs she's interacted with etc.) who can report on her typical temperament and behavior.
- Seek out the formal report from the initial offense last year – make sure a total of only two episodes exist on her record and the reporting issue that occurred was actually resolved.
- Seek out more detailed and complete medical records for the care Snap received due to her injuries inflicted on 5/26/19 (both from Referral Center and follow-up care at Crossroads). What damage was done to her? Level of bite(s)? How many stitches/staples etc.? How much did it cost to repair?
- Consider a second behavior assessment performed by another Certified Canine Behavior Professional. Informed and educated evaluations of the individual dog are important and helpful to your case.
- Formulate a new plan for containment in the yard – Ensure two secure measures of containment. Example: Consider an e-fence encompassing the physical fenced areas.

Redirected Aggression". According to the ASPCA – "Pain-Elicited Aggression" results when an otherwise gentle, friendly dog can behave aggressively while in pain. "Redirected Aggression" occurs when a dog is aroused into an aggressive response by an animal that she/he is prevented from attacking. At that time, she/he may redirect this aggression onto someone else nearby. For these reasons, people are often bitten when trying to break up a dog fight.

Finally, it is fair to note, that it is common for breed-discriminatory factors to influence laws, judgements and life/death decisions regarding Pit-type mix dogs. There is no credible evidence that breed determines or predicts dangerousness! Each dog deserves to be evaluated on a fair, thorough and individual basis.





Your pet's hospitalization: Questions and Answers

We understand how difficult it is to leave your pet in someone else's care. It is important that you feel comfortable with us and that you know that your pet will be left in the hands of professionals who care. The following is a list of questions most frequently asked by clients when their pets are hospitalized. If this handout does not address all of your concerns, please let us know so that we may answer any additional questions you might have.

1. Can I call for updates on my pet's condition?

- Yes. Our doctors and staff would be happy to provide updates on your pet's condition during his/her hospitalization. We are authorized to speak to the owner/authorized agent for the pet. This person is designated in the medical record and is also the individual responsible for authorization of care, payment of services and decisions regarding continued care.
- We understand that other family members and friends will be concerned about your pet's condition. We ask that you relay that information to them; this will help keep our doctors more available to provide medical care to their patients.

2. Can I visit my pet during the hospitalization?

- Visiting hospitalized patients is welcomed and is only discouraged when the visit causes stress or anxiety for the patient and is therefore detrimental to their recovery.
- Visits must be scheduled for specific times. If you have scheduled a visit more than 2 hours in advance, you should call just before leaving to ensure that the visit will still be OK. If during that time we have had many emergencies arrive, it might be necessary to reschedule your visit.
- The number of family members who are permitted to visit at one time might be limited depending on whether the visit will take place in our family visitation room or in our ICU. Also, children under 18 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.
- If you are asked to make a visit brief or if we request that you end a visit earlier than you expected, please understand that these requests are made with concern for your safety and so that we may provide the best care possible for your pet and for all of our patients.
- Please understand that due to confidentiality laws, we are obligated to maintain the privacy of the families of our patients. As a result we are unable to share with you information regarding the other patients in our hospital.

3. How do I arrange for my pet to be picked up?

- Once it has been decided that it's time for your pet to be discharged, we will schedule a specific discharge time. The time that is scheduled must allow our doctors and staff an adequate amount of time to prepare any medical records, discharge instructions and medications that will be sent with you and your pet.

4. How long will it take to discharge my pet?

- The discharge is an important part of your pet's medical care so we recommend that you plan on allowing anywhere from 15 to 45 minutes depending on the extent of your pet's discharge instructions.
- When you arrive for discharge, the receptionist will accept your payment for the total balance due and give you an itemized invoice. A member of our medical support team will then review your discharge instructions with you and answer any questions you might have. If you were unable to speak to the doctor on the phone when your discharge was scheduled, the doctor would be happy to speak with you at the time of discharge if he or she is available.

*Please note: We will review your discharge instructions and answer any questions you might have prior to bringing your pet to you. We do this because we have found that during the excitement of being reunited with their pet, many clients divert their attention towards their pet and away from the important discharge instructions.

Christine Morrissey - Statement Regarding the Events of May 26th, 2019:

I was upstairs cleaning the bathroom for company. I heard barking and looked out the window across from the bathroom that looks onto the patio yard as I knew that's where Snap was and wondered what she was barking at. I didn't see anything, but as I was looking I heard yelling and screaming and a dog in pain, coming from the front and ran to look out my bedroom window.

I saw a man running toward our house from the red house across the street. Jeff was on the ground in the front yard and people on the sidewalk, I didn't see Snap, or the other dog. Snap must have been under Jeff in the yard. I ran downstairs and got there just as Jeff was carrying Snap into the house. He set her down, I could see her head was bloody. He went to the kitchen sink and held his arm under running water.

He said, "I have a problem and showed me his arm with the gash. I gave him a clean towel to wrap around it and an ice pack and drove him to Theda Care Emergency.

I waited as he received 5 stitches. The police were called and he waited to talk to them while I went home to deal with Snap's injuries. The skin behind her left ear looked shredded, she had a puncture through her ear. There was a slice on her head and also a puncture mark. She would not hold still for me to clean her ear, but she let me wash some of the blood off the top of her head.

Officer Pullen gave Jeff a ride home. We brought Snap outside on her leash and she greeted Officer Pullen in her usual friendly manner. He took photos of her injuries and Jeff's. He left to speak with witnesses, saying he would be back later.

I took Snap to the referral center. They needed to sedate her to clean and stitch her wounds. They told me it would be 2 – 3 hours, and sent me home to wait for their call.

I returned home and cleaned up the blood that was on the rug, the floor the furniture, the kitchen appliances and the walls. It was evident that Snap had been shaking her head to try to relieve the pain in ear, as blood had spattered everywhere. There was a large stain on the rug from where she had laid her head.

The referral center called in the evening and I went to pick Snap up. The bill for her treatment was \$769.00.

At about 10 PM Officer Pullen knocked on the front door. Jeff and Snap were both sleeping. I spoke with the officer for a few minutes, he explained that Snap would need to be quarantined for 10 days, and that we were being cited for Dog at Large and Molests Passerby or Vehicle, he told me it was Snap's 3rd offense which I questioned. He also told me that the other dog was not injured, nor was the owner. He said other people were bitten by that dog, as they tried to help, but their injuries had not required medical attention. He said that the other dog and

owner were working with a behaviorist from the Fox Valley Humane Association, who recommended they walk the dog past our house as it was a "trigger" for their dog.

I am very upset that no one took into account how that dog's provocations affected my dog. I have seen that dog on numerous occasions barking and lunging at people, dogs, and cars. Just recently it lunged and gnashed at Jeff's truck as he drove past the Wire Works building on Lawe Street.

We had Snap evaluated by a behaviorist on Saturday, June 15th, and she was deemed to be a good girl, her behavior toward people is appropriate, and her behavior with the test dog was also appropriate. We have tried to get a 2nd opinion, but everyone else we have contacted is booked. We were lucky the 1st time as Kirstin had just had a cancellation. We have an appointment with Lindsey Bernier in August, and she has put us at the top of her cancellation list.

I am a lover of dogs and I am grateful people are willing to take on problem dogs to work with and rehabilitate them. But my dog should not be held accountable for another dog's issues. She is friendly and affectionate. She is not dangerous. She loves to greet people on her walks, and to be required to muzzle her in public is like torture to her. She is so distracted by the contraption on her face that she can't do anything but try to hook a claw into and pull it off. Muzzles are also not recommended by the behaviorist we consulted, as it leaves Snap defenseless against an attack, and unable to defend us if we are assaulted.

Jeff regrets that he did not go to court last year to contest the additional citation of Molests Passerby or Vehicle that was tacked on to the initial Dog At Large, because he can see now that it is prejudicial. He felt at the time that it was an opportunistic addition after the fact, as no person or property was injured. But going to court takes time during the work week, so he paid the fines and forgot about it. It was also the source of the confusion over how many citations had actually been issued. I believe this has now been straightened out in the police records dept.

I have always been very concerned about keeping Snap secure, either in the fenced yard or on a leash. Not because I was afraid she would injure or attack anyone, but because she is a terrier and terriers are born to chase... rabbits, squirrels, chipmunks, birds... I was worried that she would chase something and be hit by a car. Lawe Street can be a very busy street depending on the time of day, and Wisconsin Avenue is only 2 blocks north of our house.

In closing, a series of unfortunate events have put our dog in the position of being unfairly labeled as dangerous. My husband is now acutely aware that she must be on a leash or secured in the fenced yards any time that she is outside. I would request the Board take into account the evaluation from our behaviorist, the character witness statements from friends, neighbors and family, and the extenuating circumstance of the other dog's regularly repeated inappropriate behavior as it lunges past our property. It is my hope that you will rescind the

Dangerous Dog Declaration and expunge the citations issued on 5/26/19. Snap was not "at large," she was on our property, and she was the victim in the attack.

Jeffrey Verner – Statement Regarding the Events of May 26, 2019:

On Sunday, May 26 that 1:30 PM while cooking ribs on the grill on my patio our neighbor, Jack Walker, stopped over. At that time the gate was left ajar and I witnessed Snap wander onto the driveway. I immediately followed calling her name. I saw her tail go up, alerted to what were another dog and people passing the front of our house. She ran toward them. I chased her to the front of the house to see her meet the other dog on our front yard and proceed to be attacked on the left side of her face and ear. I dove to the ground grabbing Snap and asking for assistance to get the other dog to release its bite. The dog's owner was tugging at the leash.

Snap was yelping in obvious pain, and it felt like her ear was being torn and going on forever. At that point I attempted to reach around to grab the other dog's jaw and force it to release, and Snap inadvertently bit my arm once and released. In reflex I pulled my arm away as she was letting go, and ended up with a gash wound. I do not know who was able to get the other dog to release Snap. It was dragged away attempting to return. I remained over Snap. Somebody else was trying to assist me, I told them to let go and Snap made no attempt to retaliate or struggle to escape me. I carried snap into the house.

My wife, Chrissy, took me to the hospital where I received 5 stitches, Officer Pullen arrived and took me home to be interviewed and to photograph injuries to myself and Snap. I was in a state of shock at that time and do not recall my specific statement of events then.

Chrissy-

Yes, Lynne casually brought this up in conversation and I was a bit confused and caught off guard. Apparently she was working with the other dog/family at the time of the incident. I'm not sure why this hadn't been divulged to me sooner since your case had been referred to me from her.

From the sounds of it, Lynne may have been recruited from the city for testimony. She did say things happened very quickly and I think she even said something like "I didn't see all of it". So, in regards to contacting her, I'm not sure what to advise or if it would help/hurt. While she was present, she may be bound to sticking with one side or another, I'm not sure how that works. Could be a conflict of interest. Still probably ok to let your lawyer know about the situation.

The Referral bill is pretty vague. I'm surprised they don't include pictures, more detailing of the bite level etc when its a consequence of a dog fight. As a trainer, I feel like that info could be helpful! Still, you incurred a hefty fee and injury was significant enough that she was put under to receive care. I assume your vet was following up on the "hepatopathy" mentioned in the report?

I'm sure Vicky is extremely busy and overwhelmed in her new role at the shelter. Maybe the lawyer would have some pull connecting with her?

Snap is lucky to have you guys!

We love Snap and do not want to see anything happen to her. Thank you for your time and consideration.

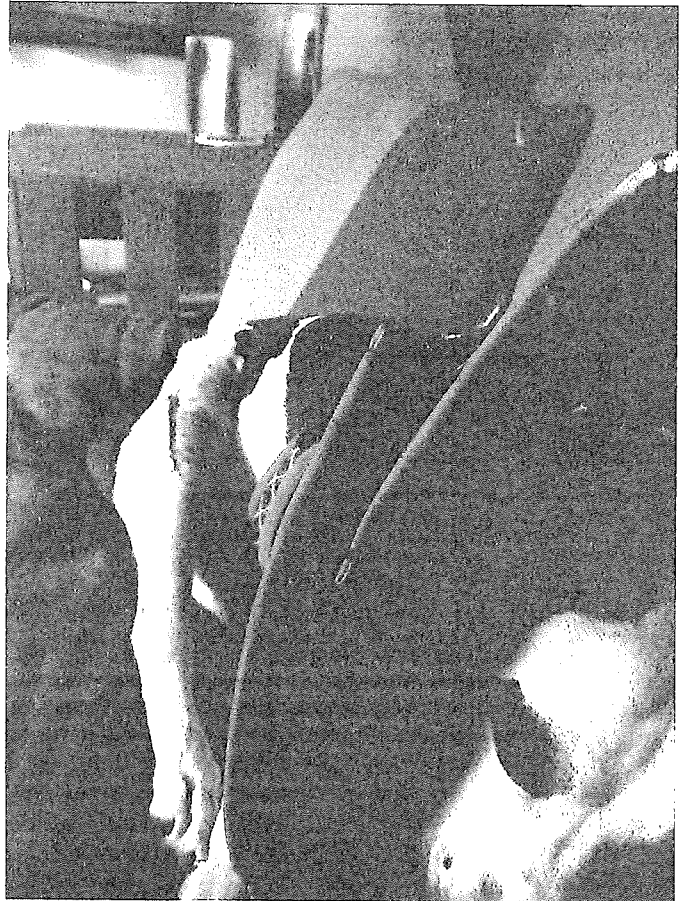
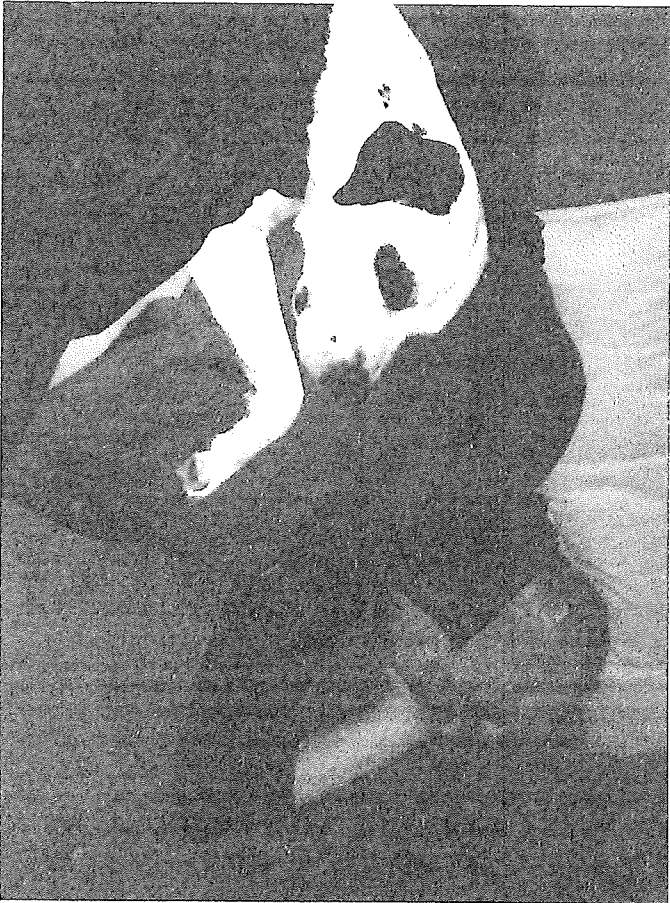
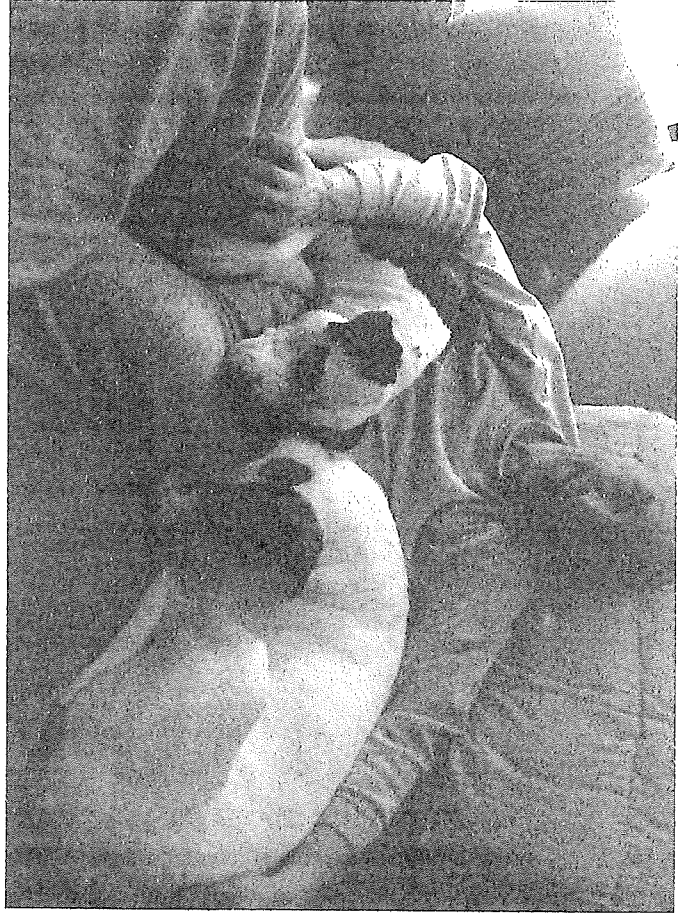

STIPULATION

The City of Appleton, by Humane Officer Matthew Fillebrown, and Christine Morrissey and Jeffrey Verner, hereby stipulate and agree as follows:

1. That Christine Morrissey and Jeffrey Verner are the owners and/or caretakers of Snap the dog.
2. That Ms. Morrissey, Mr. Verner, and Snap reside at 1102 N. Union Street, Appleton, WI 54911.
3. That on or about April 25, 2014, Ms. Morrissey and Mr. Verner adopted Snap from an animal rescue.
4. The on or about May 24, 2018, Snap was found to be running at large and molesting a passerby. Mr. Verner was cited and found guilty of Animal at Large and Animal Molesting a Passerby.
5. That on or about May 26, 2019, Snap was again found to be running at large. It is alleged that Snap attacked another animal and bit Mr. Verner- causing wounds that required medical attention. Mr. Verner was cited for animal attacks without provocation and animal at large- 2nd offense.
6. That on June 6, 2019, Matthew Fillebrown, Humane Officer for the City of Appleton, declared Snap as a Dangerous Animal.

7. That Sec. 3-131 of the Appleton Municipal Code requires an owner or caretaker of an animal that has been declared dangerous to immediately comply with leashing, muzzling, and confinement requirements of Sec. 3-132 of the Appleton Municipal Code and with all other requirements in that section being satisfied within thirty (30) days of the dangerous declaration.
8. That on June 6, 2019, Ms. Morrissey and Mr. Verner filed an appeal of Dangerous Animal declaration.
9. That the appeal of Ms. Morrissey and Mr. Verner specifically reference a hardship in obtaining the \$1,000,000 liability insurance as required by Sec. 3-3-132(g).
10. That Humane Officer Matthew Fillebrown is agreeable to waiving the \$1,000,000 liability insurance requirement in exchange for Ms. Morrissey and Mr. Verner agreeing to waive their appeal before the Board of Health.
11. That the Parties respectfully request that the Board of Health adopt this agreement to waive the \$1,000,000 liability insurance requirement. All other Dangerous Animal requirements set forth in Sec. 3-132 of the Appleton Municipal Code shall continue in full force and effect.
12. That if the Board does not adopt this agreement in full, the Parties reserve their right to present evidence at the next regular Board of Health meeting.
13. That Ms. Morrissey and Mr. Verner understand and acknowledge that they have the right to a hearing and freely and voluntarily waive that right to a hearing as consideration for this agreement.
14. That the parties have had the opportunity to review and discuss this agreement with counsel or have decided to forego that opportunity and, in either case, enter this agreement freely and voluntarily.

NOW THEREFORE, based upon the foregoing it is requested by the parties:

To Whom It May Concern,

On Monday August 5th, 2019 I met Jeffrey Verner and his dog "Snap" at my training facility located at 528 N. Main Street in Oshkosh, WI and performed a Canine Behavior Assessment on "Snap". Jeffrey was present but did not participate in the evaluation exercises. This was my first-time meeting both Jeffrey and "Snap". Jeffrey sought my Professional Dog Training services due to my being a Certified Professional Dog Trainer (CPDT-KA (Knowledge Assessed) through the Certification Counsel for Professional Dog Trainers (CCPDT). I have been assessing dog behavior professionally for 17 years.

Jeffrey shared with me that Kirstin Zaspel, MS, CPDT-KA from Beyond Obedience had also evaluated "Snap" on June 15th, 2019. I did not discuss the results of that assessment with Kirstin or Jeffrey before I evaluated "Snap" to ensure objectivity. I greeted Jeffrey and "Snap" and then immediately began the assessment. I have included the original copy of the results and kept a photo copy for my records.

The Canine Behavior Assessment was completed in a time span of approximately 45 minutes. The assessment includes testing Sociability with People, Food/Resource Guarding, Handling and Restraint, Arousal and Recovery, Prior Training, and Social Reaction to another Dog. At no time during my assessment or interactions with "Snap" did she show any aggressive responses.

My recommendation based on the assessment results for Jeffrey was to begin a training program with "Snap" to help her stay calm and focused in the presence of unfamiliar dogs both during leash walks and at home. She displayed excited and frustrated behavior on leash during the exposure to an unfamiliar dog assessment, but no outward aggressive response was noted. This behavior is not uncommon for pet dogs. Training for polite leash walking using training aids such as front clip anti-pulling harnesses, head halters and having the handler reward quiet and calm behavior help tremendously to improve this behavior.

In my experience dogs who have suffered an attack as "Snap" has, being bitten and injured by the dog passing her yard often have post traumatic responses. The training I recommended will also assist in reducing her fear responses in the future.
