PART D — PROJECT DESCRIPTION

1. Describe the activities to be carried out through this grant request and how this activity relates to the mission of your department and the City.

Arbutus Park is a neighborhood park near the center of downtown Appleton. Funding was secured in 2013 to purchase separate playground equipment for children ages 2-5 and 5-12. The activities proposed in this grant request includes the upgrading of the existing lighting in the park to LED fixtures that provides a more cost effective lighting system and improved lighting levels throughout the park, including the playground area, additional and improved lighting to enhance the pedestrian access points to the park and renovation to the pedestrian stairway on the south end of the park for improved the safety and longevity.

2. Describe how the project meets the national objective and how it fits into the program category, both chosen above (Part B).

Arbutus Park is the only green space available within the Arbutus Park neighborhood and has been recognized as the foundation of the neighborhood. The improvements to the park as identified in this project will provide increased accessibility to the park through additional and enhanced lighting and encourage positive after-sunset use of the park, including use of the playground equipment, walking, casual play, passive park enjoyment, etc. The renovated stairway will also ensure safe pedestrian travel into the park from the south side.

3. Identify the projected target population the proposed CDBG-funded program/project will serve (i.e. age, race, residency, disability, income level, other unique characteristics/information). The project will serve residents in the LMI census trail which Arbutus Park is located. The playground equipment purchased in 2013 is primarily targeted for children ages 2-12, but the improvements proposed in this grant application will encourage and promote use of the park by all members of the community and neighborhood.





4. Describe how this program/project is unique and/or coordinates with others to avoid duplication of services and meets the high priority needs of the community as chosen in Part B.

The Parks, Recreation and Facilities Management Department has been involved with a group of Arbutus Park neighbors for several years, working together to create the best possible green space for this neighborhood. Past activities included purchase and demolition of a dilapidated home that provides additional access to the center of the park, coordinated effort to remove invasion species from the park hillsides, creation of native planting areas, hillside stabilization efforts, and installation of a butterfly mosaic developed in coordination with the community and neighborhood. This project further enhances the park and improves access to a facility embraced by the neighborhood.

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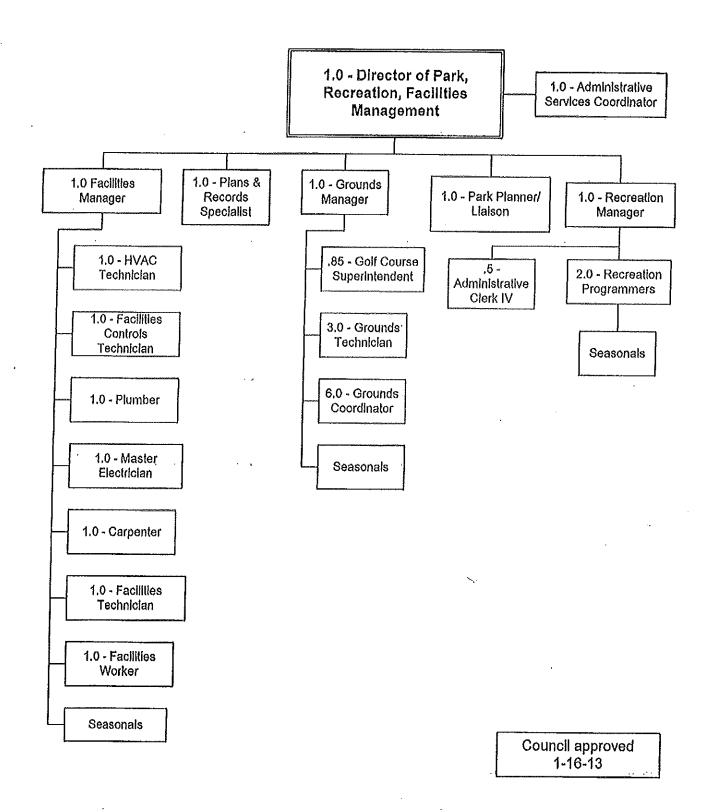

The collection of specific data and/or information is difficult because of the casual and drop-in nature of a public park. The general utilization of the park and its recreation facilities is monitored in several ways, including: communications with residents through neighborhood meetings/gatherings; regular inspections and/or maintenance activities of field staff; and anecdotal feedback from neighbors, residents, public safety personnel, etc.
