- The primary objective of the program is to create a thriving urban community through the provision of assistance to low- and moderate-income households in the forms of basic shelter, affordable housing opportunities, expanded economic opportunities, suitable living environments, and supportive services to residential, financial, and social stability
- Entitlement communities receive annual awards based on a formula set by HUD
 - The City of Appleton has been an Entitlement Community since 1974
 - The 2019 program year award was \$587,652
 \$350,899.52 was awarded to Community Partners through this competitive application process
 \$88,147.80 was awarded to public service projects (15% total*)
 - Program year operates April 1-March 31

*federal regulations dictate a 15% public service spending cap under CDBG funding.

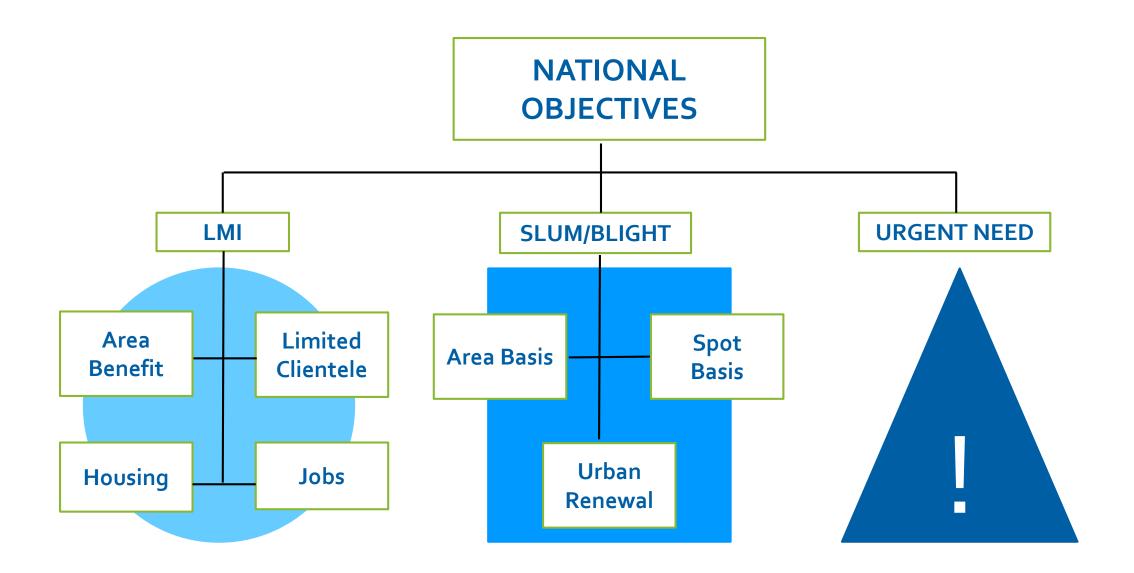

Aproximical Program Guidelines

General:

- 1) Seek a one-time use of CDBG funding
- 2) Benefit residents of LMI census tracts
- 3) Will result in additional housing units being placed on the tax roll
- 4) Demonstrate secured complementary sources of funding (leverage) and/or strong efforts to solicit and secure complementary funding
- 5) Serve special needs populations including: the elderly, persons with disabilities, persons with HIV/AIDS and their families, and persons seeking solutions to alcohol and drug addiction

Public Services:

- 1) **Program service costs (one time use)**
- 2) Administrative expenses (one time use)
- 3) **Program Service costs (continual use)**
- 4) Administrative expenses (continual use)

A Spending Caps & Limitations

- 70% of the program year grant award is the minimum amount of CDBG funds that must be expended for LMI benefit. This includes planning/administrative activities. 24 CFR 570.200(a)(3)
- 15% of the program year grant award is the maximum amount of CDBG funds that can be obligated for public service activities 24 CFR 570.201(e)(1)
- 20% of the program year grant award plus the current program year's program income is the maximum amount of CDBG funds that can be obligated for planning/administrative activities 24 CFR 570.200(g)



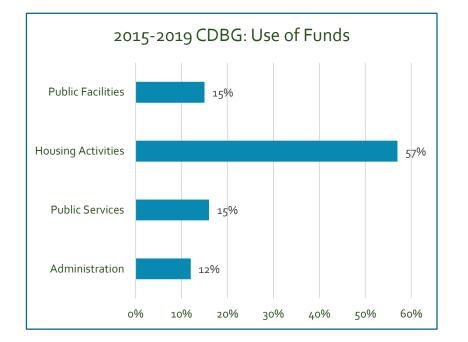
Fair Housing Services

• An annual allocation for fair housing services, in the amount of \$25,000, has been approved. The City of Appleton contracts with Northeast Wisconsin Fair Housing Services, a satellite office of the Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing office, to provide residents of the City of Appleton with a variety of fair housing services.

Analysis of Impediments

• The City of Appleton is currently under contract with Metropolitan Milwaukee Fair Housing Council to update the 2015 Analysis of Impediments, which [upon completion] will be submitted in collaboration with the 2020-2024 Consolidated Plan.

Public Services

71% indicated the use of funds for case management/life skills education for homeless persons as very important

72% stated that the need for homeless prevention services will need to increase over the next 5 years

Housing

56% indicated the use of funds for housing for persons with disabilities as very important

75% stated that the need for senior housing rehabilitation will need to increase over the next 5 years

Neighborhoods

76% rated the use of funds for the replacement/repair of streets, sidewalks and/or infrastructure as very important

68% stated that the need for neighborhood improvements will need to increase over the next 5 years
