RE: Update Wisconsin Historic Marker Application - Vulcan Hydroelectric Power

Plant replica building

On November 14, 2013, staff indicated the Wisconsin Historical Society confirmed the surplus funds in the amount of \$1460 from Certified Local Government Grant #55-13-51956-03 (Rogers House/Hearthstone) can be used to purchase a State Historical Marker Sign for the Vulcan Hydro-Electric Replica Building. The anticipated cost of the State Historical Sign to accommodate the wording for the sign is approximately \$1610. The cost difference between the surplus grant funds and cost of the sign will be paid utilizing funds from the Community and Economic Development Department budget.

On March 17, 2014, the Wisconsin Historical Society indicated they are working with the American Society of Mechanical Engineers Committee on History and Heritage and The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers regarding fact checking the narrative language provided by the Commission. Hydroelectric Central Station – Replica

Near this site in November 1882, a hydroelectric central station began operation. Known as the Vulcan Street Plant, it had a direct current generator capable of lighting 250 sixteen candle power lamps, each equivalent to 50 watts. The generator operated at 110 volts and was driven through gears and belts by a water wheel operating under a ten foot fall of water. Initially, the Vulcan Plant served two homes and four commercial customers.

This replica was built in 1932 by the Wisconsin/Michigan Power Co. to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the original plant opening. Like the original, it houses an Edison "K" dynamo.

In 1977, it was designated as a National Historic Civil, Mechanical and Electric Engineering landmark. The replica first stood on Olde Oneida Street and was moved to this location in 1987.

1. Field Work and Recording/Entering Historic Data into the Electronic Data Base.


- A. Mary Duba volunteered to research the "Columbus/Arbutus" area.
- B. Tom Werth volunteered to research the "Lawrence South of College" area.
- C. Volunteers are needed to conduct research on the following areas (see attached map):
 - Central
 - City Park North
 - City Park South
 - Peabody
 - Downtown East
 - Downtown West
 - Green Bay Road
 - YMCA
 - 3rd Ward
 - Flats
 - Pierce
 - Southside
- 2. **Photographic Images.** The Community and Economic Development staff will be responsible for having new photographic images taken of the buildings and sites being surveyed.
- 3. **Electronic Historic Data Collection Form.** Staff demonstrated on how to enter data into the electronic data collection form and how to search the Wisconsin Historical Society's Website.

- 4. **Final Analysis of Historic Data:** After all the historic data has been collected and entered into the Electronic Historic Data Collection Form for each building and site being re-surveyed, the Historic Preservation Commission will analyze and if necessary, edit the historic data contained in the database at a future meeting.
- 5. Creation of a usable web-based City Historic Building Inventory: City staff will link all the historical data gathered and photo taken to the City's Geographical Information System (GIS) to create a usable wed-based Historic Building Inventory and Map that the public can access through the City's website.

New Information:

On March 27, 2014, staff provided Nan Bunnow, Director of Humanities, Appleton Area School District (AASD) an update on Historic Building Inventory project. Ms. Bunnow confirmed AASD is interested in assisting the Commission with the Historic Building Inventory Update project. It's anticipated AASD could assist with project after the 2014 school year is complete.



Historic Preservation Certificate Awards

2014 marks the 12th consecutive year of the City of Appleton Historic Preservation Commission's Historic Preservation Certificate Awards Program. This year one (1) Historic Stewardship Certificate Award will be presented by the Mayor and the Historic Preservation Commission at the May 21, 2014 Common Council meeting. Since the inception of the program, 80 awards have been presented to property owners that recognize their efforts that helped preserve the historic resources of Appleton.

Historic Preservation Certificate Awards

General Certificate Award Eligibility Criteria:

- ℵ The property must be located within the City of Appleton.
- ★ The nominated work must have been completed within the past 5 years.
- ☆ The building/structure must be 50 years or older.
- Restoration or revitalization projects must be completed and must have been completed by the current property owner.
- If required, the property owner must have obtained required city permits and approvals for the project.
- Significant archeological resources affected by a project shall have been protected and preserved. If such resources were disturbed, mitigation measures have been undertaken.
- No Preservation Certificates are awarded for work done to the exterior of the building only, and not for any interior restoration or modification.

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Historic Preservation Certificate Awards

Certificate Award Eligibility Criteria for "Stewardship Certificate":

- Nominations in this category acknowledge projects in which the exterior character of a building or structure has been maintained, restored or rehabilitated true to the documented, or the reasonably assumed intent of the original historic design.
- Stewardship Certificates are awarded for buildings in which the owners have provided on-going care and upkeep which maintains the integrity of the original historical architectural design including detailing and materials within the parameters of the eligibility criteria for a Stewardship Certificate.
- Exterior design changes including building additions may have occurred or new materials may have been used, yet the end result needs to respect the integrity of the original historic architecture. For example: the use of modern surfacing and/or trims, replacement windows, replacement doors, etc. provided they are true to the original design of the building/structure.
- No Paint work and color palette need not match the original to the building but must be consistent with those used at the time period which the historical style of the building represents.

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Appleton Historic Preservation Commission

Responsibility of the City of Appleton Historic Preservation Commission.

The responsibility of the City of Appleton Historic Preservation Commission is to recommend protection of buildings and sites of historical and architectural significance; maintain the current survey and inventory of historic properties and districts, ensure to the maximum extent possible, public participation in the local historic preservation program; to raise community awareness of the City's history and historic resources, and reviewing proposed exterior changes to local designated buildings and sites.

Organization.

The City of Appleton Historic Preservation Commission consist of five (5) regular members and two (2) alternates appointed by the Mayor and subject to approval by the Common Council as vacancies occur or terms expire.

Members and Qualifications.

If possible, one (1) regular member shall be an architect; one (1) shall be an alderperson; two (2) regular members shall have historian, restoration craftsperson, or architectural history credentials or expertise, or other historic preservation related disciplines such as urban planning, American Studies, American Civilization, cultural geography or cultural anthropology; one (1) regular member shall be a licensed real estate broker with two (2) alternates appointed from any of the above qualifications. All members shall be selected for their knowledge of and interest in matters pertaining to this section. Alternate members shall have full voting power in the event one or more regular members have declared a conflict of interest or in the event one or more regular members are absent.

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
