CITY OF APPLETON SIDEWALK PAINTING POLICY

The objective of this policy is to establish the guidelines in which sidewalks may be painted in Appleton. This policy does not apply to sidewalk painting for utility locates or for temporary sidewalk chalk. Requests for painting sidewalks and trails within City Parks and other City-owned property shall be directed to the Parks, Recreation & Facilities Management Director.

GUIDELINES

- 1. Sidewalk painting requires a Street Occupancy Permit through the Department of Public Works and associated fee as established by Council.
- 2. The responsible party for the requesting organization must sign the Street Occupancy Permit Application Form.
- 3. The Department of Public Works shall be provided a map of the proposed sidewalk to be painted, name and type of painting material, symbol and maintenance plan as part of the application process.
- 4. Symbol shall not exceed a size of 8" x 8".
- 5. No advertising may be part of the symbol painted on the sidewalk.
- 6. Any symbols not maintained will be left to fade.

APPEAL PROCESS

Anyone denied a Street Occupancy Permit for painting sidewalks may appeal the decision to the Common Council through the Municipal Services Committee.

ENFORCEMENT

This Policy will be enforced by City staff. Any organization or individual not following the guidelines established above may lose the right for said sidewalk painting within the street right-of-way.

Subject: Safe Walks to Edison Elementary

Hello everyone,

I'm contacting you with an idea for our neighborhood from Edison Elementary principal Jim Donnellan and Edison teacher Chuck Heurkens. Their idea is to create a lightbulb stencil that we can spray paint onto sidewalk blocks to mark out designated safe routes from the Historic City Park and Peabody Park neighborhoods to Edison Elementary. We're borrowing the idea from the spray painted foxes along the sidewalk that runs from Lawe Street and College Avenue down to the biking/walking trail along the river.

The purpose of the marked routes is twofold. First, it would identify safe routes to school for families with young children. Second, we think this would be a fun way to tie our neighborhoods together and encourage families to get outside and visit an important green space in our neighborhood. I love the idea--it's a bit like following the yellow brick road to the neighborhood playground.

In some ways this is a very simple, inexpensive project. However, we realize that there are many different people who may need to give feedback and permission. I'm hoping all of you can think this over and let Jim, Chuck and myself know what our next steps should be.

CITY OF APPLETON DRONE REMOVAL POLICY

The objective of this policy is to establish the guidelines on how drones will be removed from City property, including from park and terrace trees.

GUIDELINES

1. City staff shall not remove drones from private property.

2. City staff will remove drones from City of Appleton's park and terrace trees, and all other City owned property, at the request of the drone's owner so long as the City, in the City's sole discretion, is able to safely remove the drone and the removal will not cause damage to any City property, including vegetation.

3. The drone's owner must reimburse the City based on actual costs of the time, labor, vehicles and equipment used by the City to remove the drone. Payment must be received by the City within fourteen (14) calendar days of the date the invoice was mailed to the owner. An estimate of the cost to remove the drone may be provided to the drone's owner upon request.

4. The drone's owner must sign an indemnification agreement provided by the City prior to the City removing the drone.

5. The Department of Public Works shall respond to a request to remove a drone as soon as feasible based on other assigned work tasks during normal working hours.

6. A drone stuck on City owned property, including in a park or terrace tree, which requires equipment to remove must not be removed without the assistance of the City of Appleton unless the owner has first obtained permission from the Department of Public Works and/or the Parks, Recreation and Facilities Management Department, depending upon the location of the drone.

7. If the owner of the drone is not present at the time the drone is removed, the drone shall be stored at the Department of Public Works and available for pick-up during normal business hours. If the drone is not picked up within fourteen (14) calendar days of the date the drone is removed, the drone shall become City property.

8. This policy in its entirety shall also apply to any other non-City owned property that needs to be removed from City property, including park and terrace trees.
