Recreation

Marketing:

- Developed a marketing calendar/timeline for the Recreation Division staff to utilize for timely promotion of programs/activities through:
 - website (including webtrac calendar)
 - constant contact e-newsletter
 - social media outlets
 - public service announcements
 - o flyers/brochures
 - school district monthly distributions
 - City Guide
- Utilized "Youth Sports Tuesdays" to leverage Social Media (primarily Facebook) and highlight engaging youth sports topics, promote program philosophy, and advertise registration opportunities for upcoming programs.
- A PowerPoint presentation was created highlighting the June programming highlights and events. The presentation is being shown at Mead Pool to help promote our upcoming activities.
- A new "Special Event" constant contact was created in May to help with promotion of summer special events/activities. The constant contact email list is up to 9,780 contacts and the mass emails have been averaging about a 26% open rate.
- Recreation Programmer, Nate Baldwin was a guest on "The Big One with Marques Pfaff" on June 21, through a continued quarterly partnership with 95.3 "The Score" radio

in Appleton. Segment provides us with an opportunity to establish APRD as a local authority on youth sports topics, and highlight the philosophy and offerings of the department.

- Had Stellar Blue Technology come in for a training with the staff on March 24th. The training was extremely helpful in learning how to better position ourselves through use of social media. We learned concepts, tactics as they relate to the ever changing world of social media, etc.
- Managed all website and webtrac updates to correlate with updated guide information.
- Printed 3,000 full color sports league/camp flyers, distributed to the Appleton Area School District offices, private schools, pick up sites, sporting goods stores and customer service areas in the City.
- Information for the summer/fall City Guide was submitted by staff, formatted and presented to the Mayor's office. The Guide was mailed out to residents in early March Telulah Skate Park was the front cover photo. We have also submitted all program information for the winter/spring City Guide that will be distributed in September.
- A calendar for public service announcements has been created to help the Recreation Division and local media outlets ensure programs/activities are being promoted in a timely manner.
- The Recreation Division created an Instagram account and have been utilizing it to try and reach the younger audience on social media.
- We were able to make our Constant Contact mass emails responsive for mobile users starting in January.

Community Partnerships:

- Partnered with the Head Coach of the Lawrence University Baseball team to create / provide a pre-season pitching seminar for all of our youth baseball coaches heading into the summer season. Seminar covered the basic fundamentals of youth pitching, and gave our coaches the tools to be more effective and confident in their instruction of the mechanics of pitching.
- Began preliminary partnership discussions with the First Tee of Northeast Wisconsin, with consideration being given to implementing their curriculum into our youth golf instruction efforts. We believe this partnership has the potential to provide name recognition / credibility, instructor training, and program consistency in the event of staff changes.
- Collaborated with Timothy Chappa from local organization YouthGo to learn and understand more about their "Badges for Baseball" program for teens / adolescents. We feel this could be a potential model to provide baseball opportunities for kids beyond 6th grade, in our efforts to provide more athletic opportunities for this age group.
- New collaboration for Children's Week between the Building For Kids and Appleton YMCA. Our hope is that with combined efforts our event will be highly considered by businesses and organizations to give monetary donations in order to support the events for the week. Recreation Division staff have been busy contacting local businesses/organizations to seek involvement in Children's Week by hosting an activity

at their site and/or participating in Children's Week events. Currently the Children's Parade has over 1,000 registrations with registration opening on June 1.

- We are partnering with the Appleton Public Library to gets books in our playground program sites for kids to check out and bring back (similar concept to free little library). Our hope is to keep kids reading throughout the summer and to use our program as a direct channel to reach kids.
- We have partnered with the Appleton Public Library to assist them with their Summer Reading Program. We have met with Teen Librarian Alicia Woodland to provide ideas and activities to get kids out in our parks this summer. Some of the events that we will be working on include archery instruction, baseball, swimming, bike safety, and golf. Other Recreation staff members have assisted Kabel to help instruct these events.
- Worked with Appleton Police Department, Gold Cross, And Appleton Fire Department to provide Emergency Procedures Training at Erb and Mead Pools on May 31 and June 1.
- We are partnering with Valley Transit to promote our activities during their Rock the Transit Center program taking place on Wednesdays from 11:30-1:00 p.m. during the summer months. We will have a table displaying our information on the following dates: July 6, July 27, August 17 and August 24.
- Partnering with Empower Yoga to offer Yoga in the Park for free, Wednesday evenings, June 1 August 31. . Kids Yoga in the Park is an addition two times/month for the summer of 2016. Kids Yoga runs at the same time as the regular Yoga in the Park, just in a different area within the park. The designated Kids Yoga dates are: June 8, 22, July 6, 20 and August 3, 17.
- Our division provided opportunities in the Children's Village at the annual Juneteenth event that took place on June 19.
- Partnered with the Police Department to provide a presentation for summer Playground Leaders on creating a safe environment for our participants and what to look for at their park that might be suspicious behavior.
- Partnering with Fleet Feet Sports, OSI and Community First Fox Cities Marathon on Kids Fun Runs which are offered for free four times a year at Appleton Memorial Park and provides a healthy, family focused community event.
- Working in coordination with Fox Cities Adult Athletics to ensure the continued success of the adult softball leagues at Appleton Memorial Park.
- Partnering with Xcel Sports to provide soccer fields for our Challenger Soccer Camps taking place in July.
- Partnered with Lawrence University Men's Hockey team to offer a free skate program at Jones Park.
- Partnering with the Northeast Stormwater Consortium and the City of Appleton Forestry Division to provide educational programming for our Camp APRD program.
- Partnering with the Boy Scouts to provide activities for our playground program sites once a week.
- Continue work with Neenah and Menasha Parks and Recreation Departments and the Y of Fox Cities for the annual senior games which will be held at Pierce Park this year. This group meets monthly in preparation for this event.
- Partnering with Even Start Literacy / Fox Valley Technical College to offer swim lessons

for minorities at Erb Pool.

- Partnering with 95.3 WSCO "The Score" radio station to host a quarterly in-studio on air conversation (20-30 minutes) to discuss youth sports topics and events. On-air appearance will precede a scheduled advertising run, with a goal of establishing APRD as a voice and content leader in the region.
- Worked with Appleton Police Department, Gold Cross, And Appleton Fire Department to provide Emergency Procedures Training at Erb and Mead Pools on May 31 and June 1.
- We are partnering with Valley Transit to promote our activities during their Rock the Transit Center program taking place on Wednesdays from 11:30-1:00 p.m. during the summer months. We will have a table displaying our information on the following dates: July 6, July 27, August 17 and August 24.
- Partnered with the Appleton YMCA on their annual Fox Cities Classic swim meet at Erb Pool June 18 and 19.
- June 14th we wrapped up our four week adult photography class in partnership with Debbie Daanen Photography. The class was full with 20 participants. This is the second time we have offered this class and it has been full. Talks have occurred to offer a Photography 101 and a Photography 201 in the future to keep participants progressing.
- A new partnership with Backyard Hackers where kids ages 5-14 sign up to learn about mode by coding, scratch, app creation, Minecraft (computer programming type programs) has started and has been very successful.
- Through a partnership with Gold Cross we were successfully able to obtain an AED machine free of charge to be used on-site at our youth sports leagues.

Community Outreach:

- On February 5 the Recreation Manager presented to the Youth Services Librarians through the OWLS system on incorporating movement into their library programs.
- The Recreation Manager and Golf Course Superintendent attended the career fair at Fox Valley Lutheran High School on behalf of our Department.
- April 7 one of our Recreation Programmers, Nate Baldwin, presented to the K-6th grade classes at Riverview Lutheran School in regards to our upcoming summer programs and activities.
- Heidi attended the Boys and Girls Club Summer Kick-Off event in late May at their facility which allowed our division to share all the fun activities we offer during the summer months. There were approximately 100 families in attendance.
- In May, Recreation Programmer, Nate Baldwin delivered an all-day interviewing skills class for freshmen high school students through a collaboration with Fox Valley Lutheran High School guidance department. Students were given advice on how to prepare to make a positive impression at their first job interviews, and he was given an opportunity to share details of many of the seasonal opportunities within the Parks & Recreation department.

- Recreation Programmer, Heidi Erickson attended the Air WI Employee Wellness Fair in late April. Trail maps, activity guides, youth sports, pool and kids fun run information was just some of the materials provided to Air WI employees.
- Recreation Programmer, Kabel Helmbrecht attended the Health Fair at Johnston Elementary on April 7 where he provided information to the public about upcoming programs, parks, and distributed Appleton City Guides.
- April 7 Recreation Programmer, Nate Baldwin presented to the K-6th grade classes at Riverview Lutheran School in regards to our upcoming summer programs and activities.
- Recreation Manager, Niki Wendt attended the US Venture Employee Health Fair on June 16. This was a great outreach opportunity to meet people from the area and spread knowledge about our programs, services, and amenities.
- Continuation of conversations with a small group of Appleton School District representatives (including a varsity coach, school principle, and teacher) to explore the idea of creating a unified message about youth sports philosophy, and creating a more inclusive, educational environment that encourages children to participate and be active. Intent is to couple that unified message with a collaborative program structure that reinforces full participation, skill development, and the lifelong benefits of sports and physical activity.

Program Development:

- Some exciting future developments have started with a discussion about cross country skiing at Reid Golf Course. Steve Verboomen, a current associate principal at Kimberly High School, will soon be retiring and is interested in partnering with Appleton Parks and Recreation regarding winter recreational opportunities.
- We have also begun discussions with Appleton Downtown Incorporated (ADI) regarding a future winter event involving Jones Park and downtown Appleton businesses.
- Continuing management and operations of the Scheig Learning Center. We have had 41 paid rentals by mid-year 2016. We have also developed a schedule where we are able to utilize the Scheig Center during non-peak rental times for recreation programming needs.
- Developed a revised program for our summer youth baseball, softball, and t-ball leagues where we worked with Appleton Little League to allow more diamond use in the evening to accommodate working families.
- Developed and delivered a comprehensive coach training and bi-weekly lesson plan materials to provide greater consistency in the skill development of our youth baseball, softball and t-ball participants, and rally coaches around newly defined program core principles.

- Evidence Storage System (Police Station) Project is currently under construction. Anticipated completion date of 7/1/16.

- LED Lighting Upgrades (Various Parks) Project is currently in Design with Graef Engineering. Project will include new lighting at City Park, Appleton Memorial Park, and Telulah Park. Memorial park is complete – Anticipated construction start date for City and Telulah parks is 9/19/16.

Work Order Performance

Golf Course

- Golf course opened for walking only on March 15th
- Hired new Clubhouse Supervisor on April 21st. Brian Hansen joins us after working at Riverview Country Club and most recently Eagle Creek Golf Club
- New Couple's League introduced on Wednesday evenings, full at 10 couple's
- All day and night leagues returned to Reid in 2016. The addition of a small Tuesday morning league and larger Thursday evening league have maximized our tee sheet during league time

- Family Golf Days have been introduced this summer at Reid. One Sunday per month special rates are in place for families and special short course is setup for the youngsters
- Junior Lesson Program increased from 24 kids in 2015 to 57 in 2016
- Junior League has also increased from 9 players to 24 players in 2016
- Adult City Tournament had increased numbers and players were very happy with the running of event
- The Clubhouse Supervisoris a PGA member and has started giving lessons at Reid, a missing piece in 2015

Financial Breakdown (through June 28th)

- \$356,290 has been run through our POS
 - Annual Passes \$63,955
 - Pass sales have increased by 11 but revenue is down 2% compared to 2015
 - Junior passes have been the largest increase in sales, jumping from 40 to 60
 - The largest increase in revenue comes from an additional 2 Corporate Passes being sold this year
 - 3 less family passes and 7 less senior passes were sold this year
 - Green Fees \$163,693
 - Rounds are up from 13,184 in 2015 to 14,263 in 2016
 - Passholder rounds account for almost half of this increase
 - Twilight rounds are the other line item with a nice increase, an extra 339 twilight rounds have been sold this year
 - Internally staff has made changes to the POS tee sheet to try and accommodate more 9 hole play-off #1 and #10 tee. During extremely busy periods this has allowed us to get extra walk in customers onto the course
 - Cart fees \$50,864
 - Daily cart rentals are up 14% in 2016
 - Annual pass rentals increased by 1 rider
 - An operational change to place a gas tank into the back of a pickup truck has allowed us to save roughly 3 hours per week for filling golf carts without traveling to maintenance building
 - Range \$14,836
 - Compared to 2015 an additional \$3,889 has been earned from the range
 - Early season Community Color Magazine coupon helped increase range usage
 - Merchandise \$7,302

- New merchandise was purchased and a larger variety of golf supplies are being offered this year
- Merchandise sales are up 22% over the same period of 2015
- Food and Beverage \$45,984
 - All categories within F & B have increased
 - Menu simplification and new options have helped increase food sales and minimize waste

Marketing efforts in 2016 to date

- A comprehensive 52 week marketing plan was developed and is in use
- Two new Reid Golf Course flyers were created and printed, one for daily rates, fees and information and the other pertains to businesses and outings
- Community Color Mailer offering specials to get people to the course
- Radio ads have been used multiple times throughout the year to promote tournaments, course opening, family days, etc.
- Constant Contact email marketing, our email blast list, has grown from 1,890 at the beginning of 2015 to 2,244 currently.
- Reid Golf Course attended the Fox Cities Golf Expo with great response and feedback by those who attended. Look for us to continue doing this in the future
- Reid Golf Course was also included in a Spring Golf Flyer throughout the Valley
- The Reid Golf Course phone app is now available for use
- Continued use of Golfnow Reservations as a third party online tee time reservation site to increase our presence
- An emphasis has also been placed to increase our social media presence

Grounds

- Golf Course made it through winter with very minimal damage
- Spring weather allowed for nice course conditions and early opening
- Grounds projects beyond routine maintenance finished in first half of 2016:
 - All bunkers were edged leading up to the City Tournament necessary to do once per year and once complete staff can keep a nice edge throughout season with string trimming.
 - New stone pavers were added to select cart path edges where carts cut corners (photo below of crossing/intersection at #1 tee).
 - Landscape beds were edged, mulched and pruned
 - A previous under maintained area on East side of clubhouse was pruned extensively and two shrubs were moved from #15 landscaping to the clubhouse planting to help fill in the area/block the air conditioner from view from #18.

- New drainage was added near #10 ladies tee to keep the path drier after rains and to improve the quality of the path. This drainage project is a precursor to the path extension happening later this year
- A new moisture probe was purchased this year which efficiently and directly determines watering practices. A dryer golfer course soaks up heavy rains quicker allowing for carts, less disease pressure and overall healthier turf. The moisture probe attaches a number value to each area probed relating to the amount of moisture currently available. This information is evaluated and individual sprinkler run times will be adjusted to try for a uniform moisture level after irrigation cycles.
- Parking lot repair to East entrance of Customer Parking lot, repair made by DPW
- New for 2016 select Ash Trees have been injected with Insecticide to protect them from the Emerald Ash Borer. This is an every other year process and takes just a few minutes per tree, the injection product is expensive so only key Ash are treated. Key Ash are determined by how they affect the playability of the hole, protect other areas from errant shots, shape, structure and health of the tree. The rest of the Ash are treated with another method called a soil drench.
