Dear Ms. Vandehay, Council Alderpersons
City Leaders and fellow citizens:

We have been City residents since 1994 after I was raised here by my family from 1964 to 1981. Regarding the reputation Appleton has, I am proud of progressive nature of our City. We have welcomed others to our City over my life-time. This includes hosting and honoring Martin Luther King Junior's legacy, rejecting past sundown town traditions, including ^{celebrating} ~~a~~ ^A Vone Kenth & Hmong New Year.

I would like Appleton to continue it's history of sensitivity by promoting all homeowners to use a 30 gallon waste can which would NOT be subject to an additional fee as this current proposal advances.

As an additional incentive to put more ~~waste~~ ^{waste} land fill onto the dump/land fill, biweekly collection (every other week) can be offered. ~~the~~ For many Appleton households, this additional fee will be one (more) too many.

In our household, we compost actively throughout the year. It helps our garden as well as the landfill by our non-use.

We actively use ~~of~~ our recycling container and upon it's biweekly collection, it is normally half full. We are open to have this container picked up at it's current frequency or even once per month.

I believe the overflow schedule that Green Bay and Oshkosh use would adequately address this need. To increase sensitivity I hope this committee interviews land lords who face space clearing needs more frequently. I also suggest sensitivity to our non-profit Housing-related associations.

Appleton is striving to be a destination city in order to continue its' ethnic vibrancy, economic development and its' own sustainability. I urge you to recommend No Fee for garbage collection for homes / addresses using the \$30 gallon container. Please continue to promote recycling with Outagamie County and composting with the Fox River Academy. These steps have helped us continue to be proud Appletonians.

I have no objection to the current, or even higher rates, for those using 60 or 90 gallon containers. Sincerely,
