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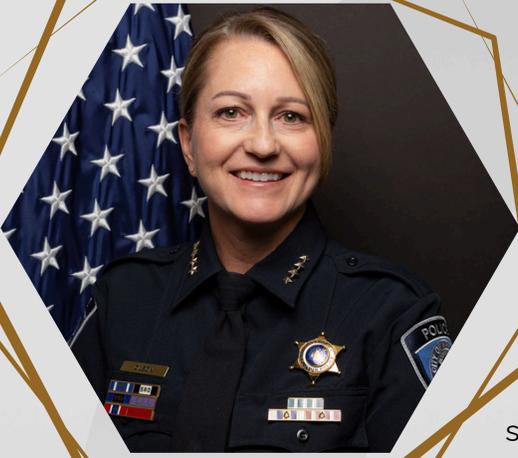
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A LETTER FROM CHIEF OLSON

POLICE & FIRE COMMISSION

The Appleton Police and Fire Commission (PFC) is a five-member board appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Common Council to oversee the hiring, promotion, and discipline of police and fire personnel in accordance with Wisconsin state law. Their primary duties include appointing and removing police/fire chiefs, approving personnel appointments and promotions, and conducting disciplinary hearings.

Key Duties and Responsibilities:

- **Personnel Management:** The commission has exclusive authority to hire, promote, or discipline sworn personnel, insulating them from local politics.
- **Chief Appointment:** They are responsible for appointing the Chief of Police and the Chief of the Fire Department.
- **Discipline and Appeals:** They review and hold hearings on charges brought against department personnel, including those initiated by the chief or citizen complaints.
- **Policy & Procedures:** Working with human resources, they develop policies for hiring and promotion within the departments.
- **Operational Oversight:** They approve competitive examinations for positions and oversee departmental staffing.

The Police and Fire Commission operates independently to ensure that police and fire departments are managed based on merit, not politics.

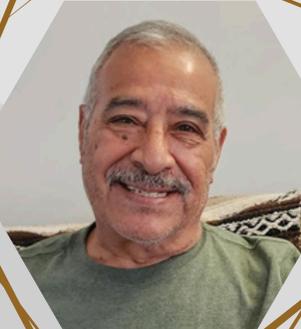

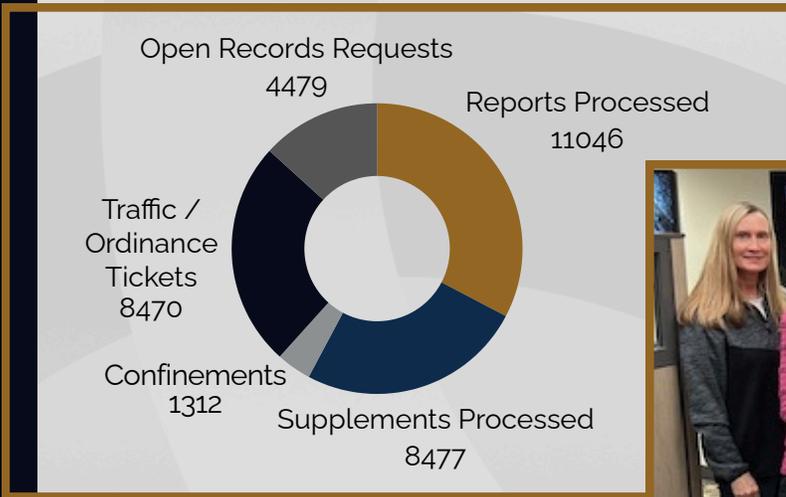

FISCAL RESOURCES

The Office of Fiscal Resources provided comprehensive financial oversight of a \$22 million general operating budget and over \$300,000 in grants funded by federal, state, and local agencies. Budgetary compliance responsibilities included budget development, account monitoring, cost analysis, training and travel management, grant administration, payroll oversight and a broad range of additional fiscal functions. This unit also evaluated short- and long-term assets and liabilities to strategically support departmental programs and operations.

- Patrol is comprised of two groups (Red and Blue) who work alternating schedules comprised of mostly 12 hour shifts.
- Each group has 30 patrol officers (when fully staffed), 5-6 Patrol Lieutenants, and 1 Captain.
- Each shift maintains minimums based on the time of day, per best practice.

Patrol is the first responding unit on all calls for service. The backbone of the department and the launching point for all career paths at the APD. Our patrol officers carry caseloads and have the ability to see calls for service through to the end. Yet, they also have the ability to transfer the case to the appropriate Investigative Services Unit (ISU, SRO, SIU, CRU) to follow up on. Most Patrol officers are also trained in crisis intervention.

TRAFFIC SAFETY UNIT

The main focus of the Traffic Safety Unit is just that, traffic safety. This team reads and addresses complaints submitted on our website, fulfills media requests and monitors and deploys units to address speed concerns, as well as operating motor vehicles while intoxicated. While Sgt. McCord and Officer Jakobsen's primary focus is on traffic safety, that doesn't mean it stops there. All officers work daily to maintain safety in our community. In 2025, our top three Patrol Officers conducted 440, 390, and 348 traffic stops respectively; an impressive combined total of 1,178 stops completed by just three officers.



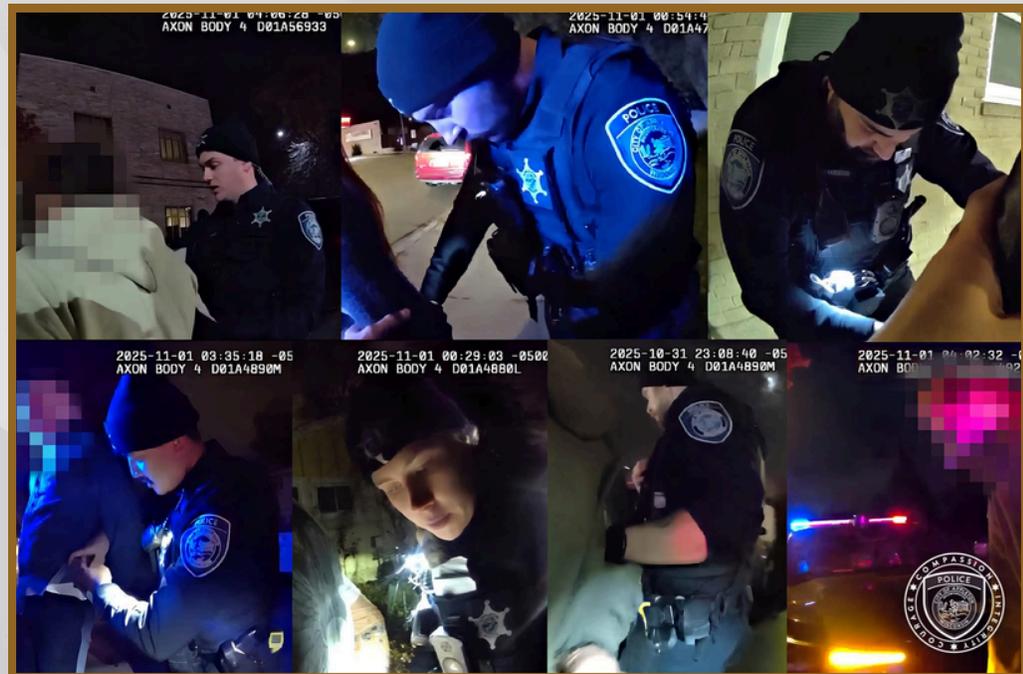

This Unit is comprised of 8 members who are cross-trained to operate small unmanned aerial systems and the APD robot.

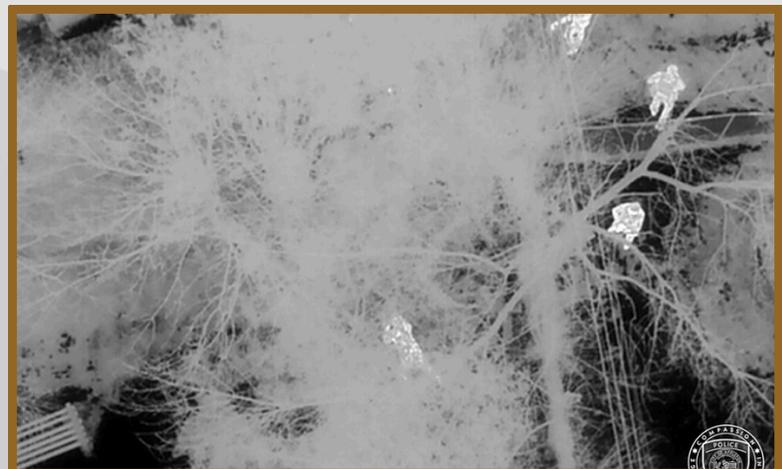
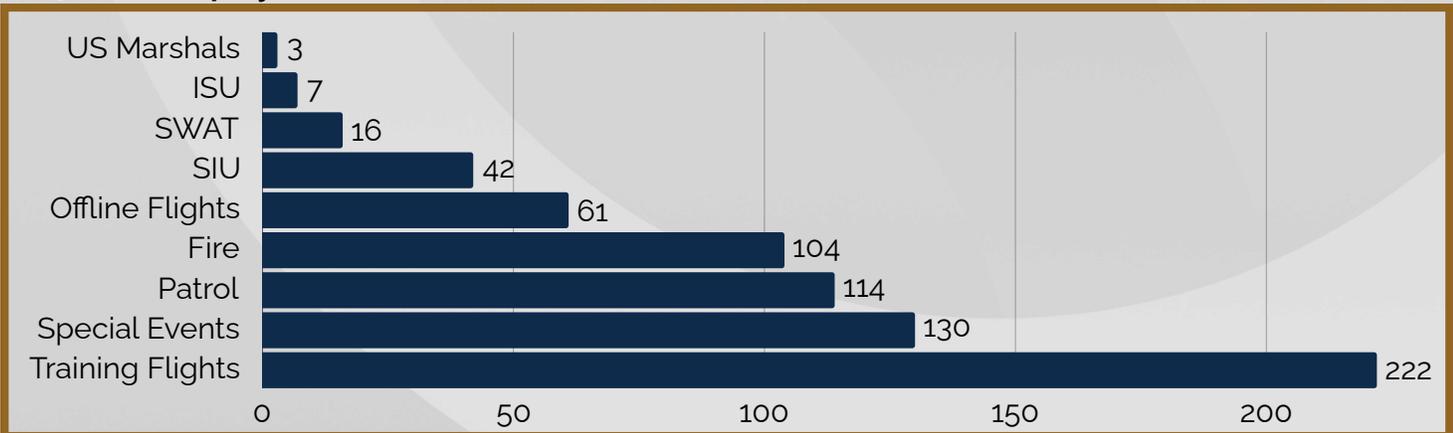
The APD Technology Unit operates on a near 24/7 coverage, and is utilized in many situations to include:

INVESTIGATIVE SERVICES UNIT

Captain Mike Wallace oversees both the Investigative Services Unit (ISU) and Community Resource Unit (CRU). These units are comprised of Investigative Services, Special Investigations, School Resource Officers and Community Resources.

The Investigative Services Unit (ISU) is comprised of 10 detectives and a dedicated unit Lieutenant. ISU members have specialized training and years of experience working complex cases. They investigate major felonies such as homicides, frauds, burglaries, and robberies. Investigators work closely with patrol officers and forensic evidence specialists to identify witnesses, preserve crime scenes, gather critical information, and develop leads. During 2025, the Investigative Services Unit responded to 27 after-hour call-ins.



Major Incidents in 2025

- Early in 2025, Investigators began a theft investigation with Hearthstone Historic House. Felony theft charges were referred to the Outagamie County District Attorney's Office on Steve Jahnke, a former employee. This case remains pending.
- On 05/19/2025, Investigators were sent to investigate a Robbery based off of a marketplace deal. After an extensive investigation, Mitchell Terry was arrested and confined at the Outagamie County Jail on charges of Armed Robbery, False Imprisonment, and Felony Bail jumping.
- In early September, Investigators had a jury trial for Samantha Krebs. Krebs was arrested in connection with a homicide investigation in August of 2024. After 7 days of jury trial, Samantha Krebs was found guilty of 1st Degree Intentional Homicide.
- On 10/04/2025, Investigators were called in to investigate a fatal vehicle crash. Carter Green was taken into custody and confined at Outagamie County Jail on 1 count of 1st Degree Reckless Homicide and OWI causing Injury.

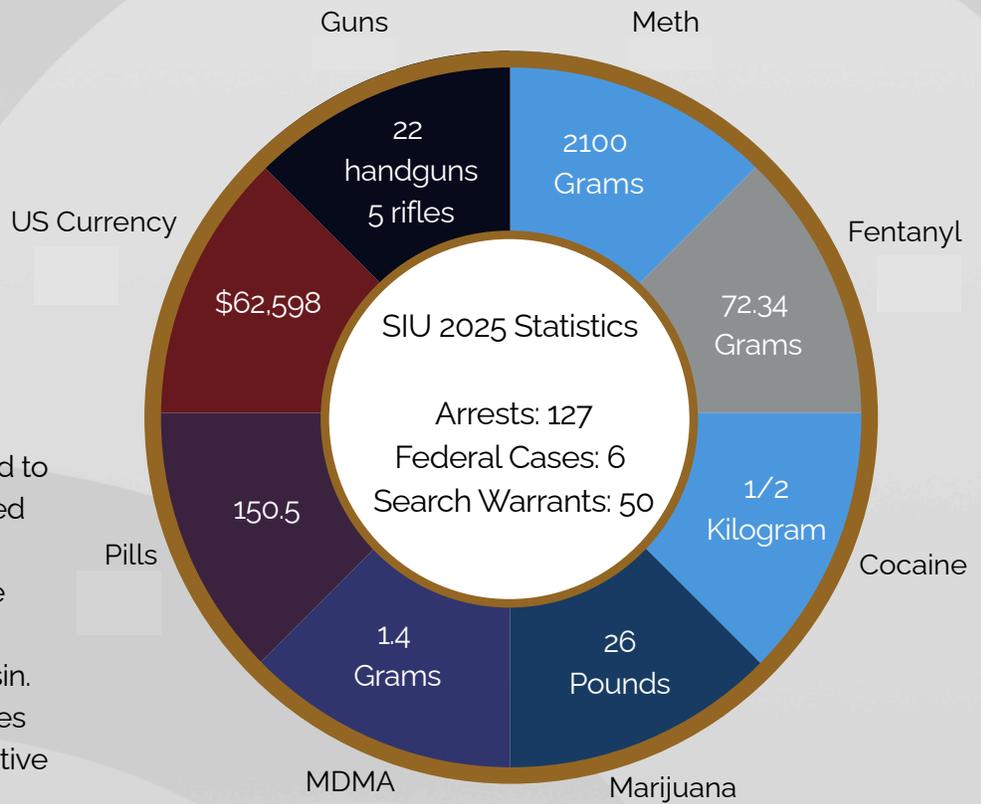
SPECIAL INVESTIGATIONS UNIT

In 2025, members of the Special Investigations Unit (SIU) continued to work in partnership with the United States Marshals Service to apprehend many fugitives whose crimes have impacted the city of Appleton and Northeast Wisconsin. Additionally, SIU regularly provides assistance to patrol, the Investigative Services Unit (ISU) and, sensitive crimes investigators in locating and arresting wanted individuals.

The Special Investigations Unit continued their partnership with the Lake Winnebago Metropolitan Drug Unit throughout 2025, assigning one full time Narcotics Investigator to the unit. SIU investigators also created or assisted LWAM regularly on narcotics investigations in the City of Appleton and greater Fox Valley area resulting in the following:

The School Resource Officer Unit consists of a Lieutenant, 11 sworn officers and one officer directly assigned to investigate sex offenses. This team successfully investigates many sensitive crimes towards children involving sexual assault, physical abuse and neglect.

In 2025, members of the SRO unit joined forces with the WI DCI Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. This collaboration led to a multitude of arrests and identification of local victims.

Our SRO Unit actively participated in 260 events with the Appleton Area School District. The events and activities they participated in include: parades, homecomings, sporting events, school dances, color runs, roller skating, family nights, etc.

The Basic Needs Team housed at the Appleton Police Department, is comprised of Appleton Health Department employees Liz Croley and Cheryl Schefe. They play a vital role in connecting individuals and families experiencing homelessness or hardship to resources in our community.

This team helps those at risk of or currently experiencing homelessness, assists individuals with accessing food, shelter, housing, and employment resources. They have also established strong partnerships within the community. One of the team's key initiatives is the Interagency Collaboration meeting, which brings together various local agencies to provide coordinated support for those struggling to meet basic needs.

In 2025 the Basic Needs Team partnered up with the City's "Sunshine Committee" to raise roughly \$4500 worth of donations over the holidays which were delivered to Boys and girls club, Harbor House and Pillars. Liz and Cheryl also meet with each new officer to provide the necessary information for their roll, prior to the officers starting Field Training.

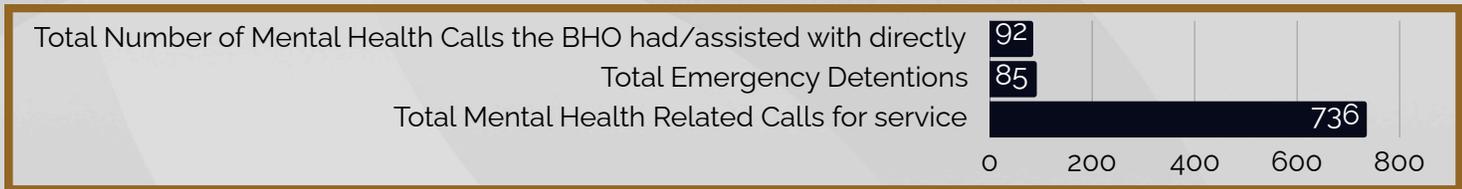

Officer Grier-Welch worked in the capacity of the **Behavioral Health Officer** for a part of 2025 prior to transitioning to another role, while Officer Corbett then transitioned into the Behavior Health Officer role.

The Behavioral Health Officer serves as the department's liaison for mental health-related issues, coordinating community partnerships, supporting officers, and reducing repeat calls for service through diversion and proactive response planning. Our department maintains a strong partnership with NAMI of the Fox Valley and is proud to serve as a certified team. The Appleton Police Department also actively organizes and participates in CIT (Crisis Intervention Team Training) and CIP (Crisis Intervention Partners) trainings throughout the region, placing a strong emphasis on training our patrol officers, ensuring a trauma-informed and enhanced crisis response that reflects our commitment to best practices in serving the community.

Sarah is a **Clinical Therapist** with Outagamie County Crisis, and has been embedded at the Appleton Police Department for the past 4 years. She works second shift and is available as a resource for officers to consult with regarding mental health or crisis situations. When needed, she also responds to mental health and crisis calls with officers, providing an on-scene response which helps avoid taking people to the hospital for an evaluation and, allows us to connect people with appropriate resources. Sarah works daily with officers to improve their response to mental health and crisis situations by providing consultation, training, and ensuring that officers are aware of community mental health resources. Multiple times a year she provides training to officers and community members on Ch 51, emergency detentions, and crisis services.

In 2025, she assisted with over 400 mental health related calls, this includes consultations with officers and on-scene response. Of those calls, only 6 ended in an involuntary hospitalization/emergency detention. About half of the calls were diversions, thus due to these interventions we were able to prevent an emergency detention or hospitalization by referring to community resources such as the mental health navigator, behavioral health walk-in clinic, Catalpa Health, or other resource.

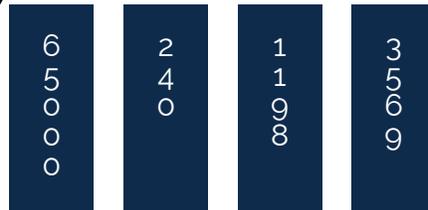

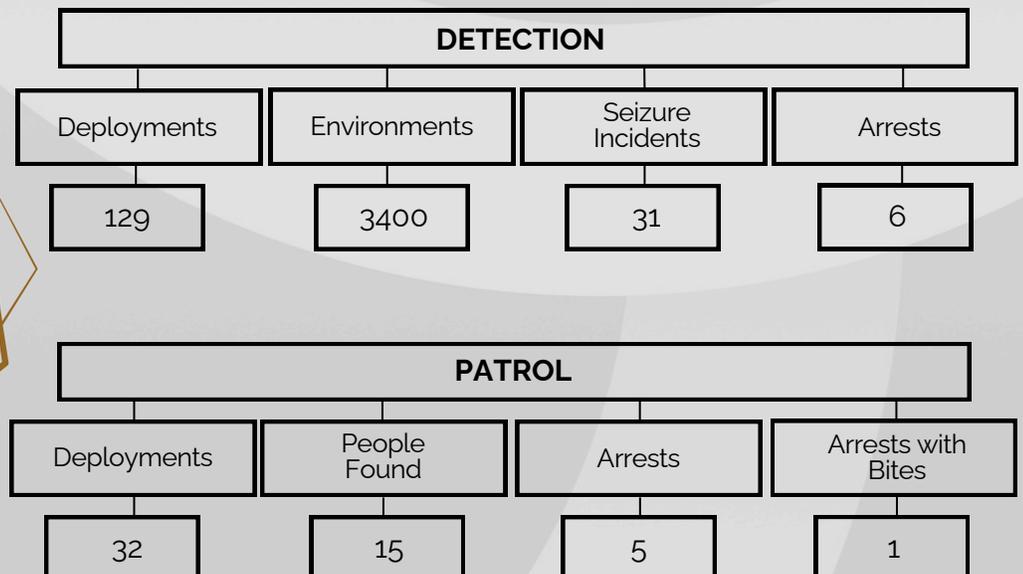
The Appleton Police Department K9 Unit is comprised of a total of five K9 Teams. Four of these teams are dual purpose teams, trained in patrol and detection work. The fifth team works directly with supporting victims and community engagement. At the end of 2024 and the beginning of 2025, the APD K9 Unit welcomed three new K9s and two new handlers to the team. Officer Doemel and K9 Drakon were both new members and completed their training at the end of 2024. Moving into 2025, Sgt. Rohm took on his 3rd K9 partner, Quinn. The final new team consisted of Officer Norris and K9 Kaleb. In addition to these three new teams, Officer Rieth and K9 Onyx continued to be members of the APD K9 Unit.



The dual purpose K9 Teams are utilized to support the Appleton Police Department with drug/explosive detection and patrol work. Patrol work is comprised of building searches, tracking, and apprehension. These teams deploy not only in the City of Appleton but also surrounding jurisdictions when requested. Officer Doemel and K9 Drakon specifically are used to support the Green Bay Packers (and other NFL Teams) along with the Wisconsin Badgers.

The final members of the APD K9 Unit are the facility K9, Edison, and his handler Sgt. Duven. This team works directly with victims, providing support during interviews, trial preparation and trial testimony. K9 Edison is also utilized through the AASD and during other community engagement events.

RIDE ALONG PROGRAM

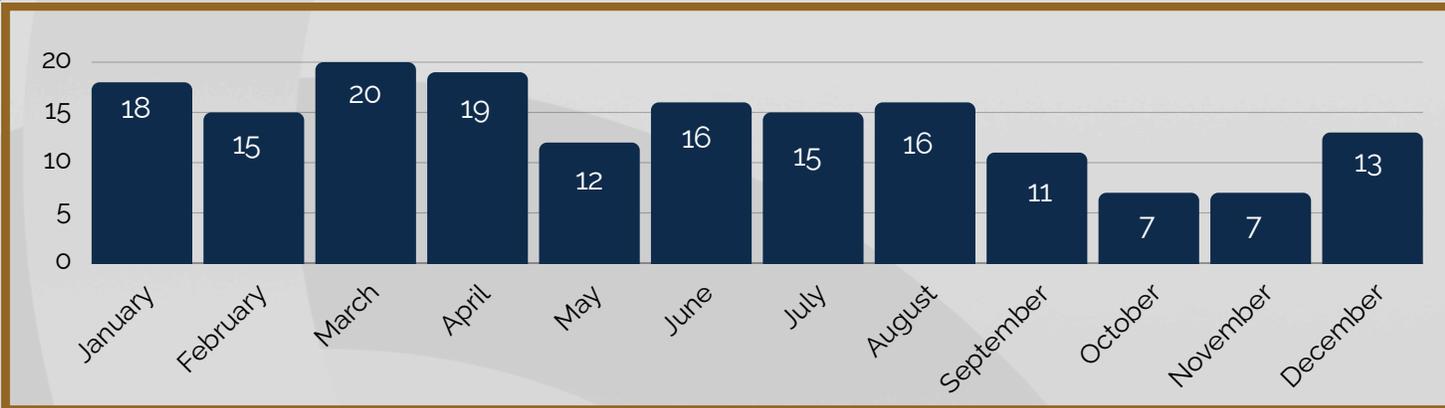

TRAINING UNIT

In 2025, the professional development efforts at the Appleton Police Department continued to evolve. Plans were put in place to add a second lieutenant to the training unit. This allowed for planning more frequent in-service training in 2026 to cover a wide range of topics. The training will include an increased focus on defensive tactics, firearms skills, and equipment utilization. In-service training sessions will utilize our dedicated defensive tactics room, firing range, and two training rooms. Offering these trainings with internal instructors allows more officers to attend more frequently. Our motto in 2026 is "train a little a lot" to maximize learning opportunities while keeping officers engaged in relevant topics.

The use of virtual reality and emerging technologies continues to grow. Virtual reality allows trainers to run a large number of officers through scenarios quickly and safely. In 2026, we will be able to have multiple officers interact in the same scenario and incorporate artificial intelligence into subject responses. Officers currently have the ability to interview an AI "victim" to practice de-escalation and refine CIT-related skills. The Appleton Police Department will continue to innovate training methods wherever possible to remain a leader among Wisconsin law enforcement.



Training topics in 2025 ranged from general to highly specialized, including:

Officers are continually encouraged to share what they've learned with their peers. Any time an officer has the ability to attend outside training and bring those skills back makes our entire department more knowledgeable.

USE OF FORCE

During 2025, officers from the Appleton Police Department used a level of force that met the reporting requirements during a total of 67 calls for service involving 72 total people. As in previous years, passive countermeasures accounted for the majority of techniques used by officers to affect an arrest. The most common use of force utilized by officers were decentralizations. This involves bringing a resisting subject to the ground for a more stable and secure handcuffing position. Appleton officers decentralized 59 of the 72 individuals.

Appleton officers also used an ECD (TASER) deployment to assist in detaining or arresting 8 individuals (up 1 from the previous year). There were no uses of deadly force. These uses of force occurred during a variety of days, times, and locations. As a direct result of the uses of force there were 14 officers with injuries either visible or claimed.

How We Take Care of Our Own

- The Appleton Police Department is part of the Outagamie County **Peer Support** Team who's mission is to provide all members of the law enforcement community, who may be suffering from emotional, personal, physical, or stress related difficulties, access to high quality support services so as to have an opportunity to work at resolving any difficulties they may be experiencing. The Outagamie County Peer Support Team exists to provide a voluntary and confidential outlet for officers, employees, and their families, who have a need to talk about conflicts or feelings they may have concerning their job, their home situations, or both. The Appleton Police Department has 11 employees who volunteer to be part of the Peer Support Team.
- **Wellness Visits** are scheduled on an annual basis with a licensed therapist. Additional sessions are available and optional.
- **Facility K-9 Edison** is available to staff when he is in the building. The comfort and entertainment he brings to everyone is unmatched.
- Outagamie County **Chaplain Program** provides emotional, mental, and spiritual support to law enforcement officers, staff, and their families. There is no charge for any of the service the Police Chaplain's provide; there are four chaplains on call 24/7.
- The City of Appleton has a **Health Coach** available to staff for blood pressure checks, weight management, stress management techniques, individualized exercise programs, healthy lifestyle coaching, etc.
- **EAP** (Employee Assistance Program) is offered to all City employees: ComPsych
- **Critical Incident Debriefs** occur with all members involved in the incident, along with a licensed therapist. This provides a safe space to discuss feelings, thoughts, flashbacks, coping skills and other pertinent items. These debriefs are important to ensure positive coping, comradery, understanding and growth for all involved.
- We have a **Fitness Center** in our department which allows all staff members equal opportunity to work out and focus on personal strength. This also plays into annual fitness testing and S.W.A.T. try outs for sworn staff.
- The Appleton Police Department has a **Mother's Room** for new mother's who need to express breast milk for their child; providing privacy and a fridge for storage.
