### **Sec 3-1 Definitions**

**Dangerous Animal** means any of the following:

(1) Any animal which, when unprovoked, inflicts bodily harm on a person, domestic pet or animal on public or private property.

(2) Any animal which repeatedly chases or approaches persons in a menacing fashion or apparent attitude of attack, without provocation, upon the streets, sidewalks or any public grounds or on private property of another without the permission of the owner or person in lawful control of the property.

(3) Any animal with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack, to cause injury to, or otherwise threaten the safety of humans or other domestic pets or animals.

**Bodily Harm** means bodily injury including, but not limited to, a laceration requiring stitches, any fracture of a bone, a concussion, a loss or fracture of a tooth or any temporary loss of consciousness, sight or hearing.

## Narratives

### Original Narrative

**03/02/2026 23:22:06**

On 03/02/2025 at approximately 1500 hours, I, CSO Ceballos #9560, was working as a fully uniformed Community Service Officer with the City of Appleton, Outagamie County, WI. I was dispatched to E RUBYRED DR for an animal bite that occurred at the location. Call notes indicated to see RP at Rubyred Dr.

Upon arrival, I was met with the RP identified as Kaylie N. Pedranzan. I introduced myself to Kaylie and asked what happened. Kaylie informed me she was walking westbound on E Rubyred Dr with the victim dog identified as Paisley. When walking Paisley, the door to E Rubyred Dr opened where the owner later identified as Kenya L. Wilson and her two dogs Alpha and Zulu were seen walking out with both dogs already leashed. Kaylie informed me that she was on the opposite side of the road from the home. When eye contact was made between the dogs, Zulu pulled away from Kenya and charged at Paisley which caused Kenya to lose grip off the leash. Both Paisley and Zulu were both barking and growling at each other but no physical contact was made between the two. Kaylie then informed me that Kenya went to grab Zulu to get back control, upon getting Zulu under control, Kenya had approached close enough to Paisley on the road where Alpha was close enough to bite Paisley while still being leashed. Alpha then bit and latched onto Paisley's left shoulder and didn't let go for a few minutes. Once both dogs separated, Kaylie attempted to go to Blue Pearl Pet Hospital then ultimately went to Countryside vet for treatment. Kaylie informed me that Paisley was then sedated and received 5 stitches on the wound by the shoulder. Kaylie noted that Kenya paid for the treatment for Paisley. I asked Kaylie if Paisley had been vaccinated for rabies vaccination, Kaylie informed me that Paisley was up to date for rabies but did not have proof. Kaylie confirmed Countryside vet was visited previously. I informed Kaylie that Countryside will be contacted through phone to confirm rabies vaccination. I then asked Kaylie if Paisley was licensed through the city of Appleton. Kaylie informed me Paisley was not. I informed Kaylie that would be in violation of AC

3-66 License required for dogs and cats which will result in a warning. Kaylie was understanding. I then asked Kaylie if she had any further questions, no further questions were asked. I then left the scene shortly after to speak to Kenya at E Rubyred Dr.

Upon arrival, I knocked on the door and was met with Kenya's fiancé. I introduced myself to Kenya's fiancé and asked if Kenya was home. Kenya's fiancé informed me that she was at work and that he was not around at the time of the animal bite. I thanked Kenya's fiancé and informed him that I will return once Kenya comes back. I then left the scene shortly after.

Approximately at 1830 hours, I attempted to contact Country vet to confirm rabies vaccination status. I was unable to contact Countryside and then started to E Rubyred Dr to speak with Kenya.

Upon arrival, I was met with Kenya outside. I introduced myself to Kenya and asked for her side of the story. Kenya informed me that when opening her door to take both dogs on a walk, Zulu had broken free from Kenya's grip with the leashed still attached to charge at Paisley. Kenya confirmed no physical contact occurred between both Zulu and Paisley. Upon getting control of Zulu, Kenya noted that when getting control of Zulu, Alpha was close enough while leash to bite and clench onto Paisley. I confirmed with Kenya that Zulu was on the roadway without being controlled by an owner. Kenya confirmed that Alpha did clench onto Paisley for a brief time without letting go. I asked Kenya if Zulu or Alpha suffered any bites from the attack, Kenya informed me both of her dogs did not suffer any wounds. I explained to Kenya that due to Alpha still being controlled on a leash, this would not be in violation of AC 3-15 (a) Animal to not run at large. I also informed Kenya that due to Zulu breaking free from her grip which resulted in Zulu being on a roadway without an owner that she would be in violation of AC 3-15 (a) Animal to not run at large. I also explained to Kenya that due to Zulu only barking and growling to Paisley, the violation of AC 3-15 (a) Animal to not run at large will only result in a warning. Kenya understood. I then explained that due to Alpha biting and clenching onto Paisley's shoulder for an extended amount of time, this would be in violation of AC 3-15 (b) unprovoked animal attack which is an automatic citation. Kenya also understood the citation. Kenya was able to provide documents for both dogs for licensing and rabies vaccination. I informed Kenya that no quarantine will be issued at the time due to both dogs seeming to be vaccinated for rabies. I asked Kenya if she had any further questions, no further questions were asked, I then left the scene shortly after.

Approximately around 1925 hours, I received a phone call from Countryside vet regarding Paisley's rabies vaccination, I introduced myself and asked Countryside regarding the procedure that occurred the night prior. Countryside informed me that the procedure did occur the night prior and informed me on the stitches. I then asked Countryside if Paisley had been determined vaccinated prior to the animal bite. Countryside informed me that Paisley was overdue for a rabies vaccination back in January of 2026 and would not be determined vaccinated. Countryside informed me that Paisley was then vaccinated after the procedure. I thanked Countryside for the information and ended the call shortly after.

Due to Paisley being determined unvaccinated for rabies vaccination prior to the animal bite, this would make Kaylie in violation of AC 3-18 Rabies vaccination required. Due to Paisley not being vaccinated at the time of the animal bite, an APD Order To Quarantine will be issued for the attacking dog Alpha for a 10 day 3 visits. I then attempted to contact Kenya to have the form filled out. I was able to make contact with Kenya through a phone call. I introduced myself to Kenya and explained to her on the new information acquired by Countryside vet. Kenya was understanding and was available to fill out the quarantine form. I then headed to E Rubyred Dr to meet with Kenya.

Upon arrival, I explained the quarantine form where Alpha will need to be seen by a vet of her choosing within a 24 period. Kenya was understanding of the situation. The quarantine form was then filled out and attached. I thanked Kenya for her cooperation and left the scene shortly after. I then attempted to contact Kaylie through phone call to inform her on the rabies status but was unsuccessful.

**INTRO**

On 3/6/2026 while working as the Lead Community Service Officer and Humane Officer for the city of Appleton I followed up on this Animal Bite incident. Upon reading CSO Ceballos report, I felt that further investigation was need to see if ALPHA meet the criteria of being declared as a dangerous animal.

**INVESTIGATION**

Incident# A26011418: On 03/02/2026 The Appleton Police Department was informed of an animal attack involving ALPHA. The report indicated that ALPHA had attacked another dog who was walking with its owner, on a leash, around E. RubyRed Drive. During this attack it was reported that Alpha bit another dog and would not let go of the victim dog's shoulder. Injuries sustained by the victim dog included a laceration on the victim dog's left shoulder. This wound needed stitches and a drainage tube due to the severity of the bite caused by ALPHA. This animal attack was determined to be an unprovoked attack.

**CONTACT WITH KAYLIE**

I made contact with Kaylie to ask more clarifying questions in regards to what happened during the attack. Kaylie told me that she was walking Paisley on a leash when Kenya had left her house with her two dogs leashed. Kaylie told me that Kenya lost control of her one dog, Zulu, who came running at her and Paisley. Kaylie then told me that Kenya came over to her and regained control of Zulu and started to walk away. Kaylie said that is when Alpha slipped his collar and then charged at Paisley and attacked Paisley. I verified with Kaylie that Alpha had slipped his collar and she said yes. Kaylie told me that she was scared for Paisley and hers safety. Kalie then told me that she was kicking at Alpha and that Kenya was pulling on Alpha to try to stop the attack. Kaylie said that Kenya was able to finally get control of both of her dogs.

**DANGEROUS ANIMAL DECLARATION**

The Dangerous Animal Definition, according to City of Appleton Ordinance 3-1, states that any animal which, when unprovoked, inflicts bodily harm on a person, domestic pet or animal on public or private property. It also states that any animal with a known propensity, tendency or disposition to attack, to cause injury to, or otherwise threaten the safety of humans or other domestic pets or animals.

The City of Appleton does not recognize the act of a dog being walked by its owner, on a leash and under the control of its owner, to be considered provocation for another dog to attack it.

Due to ALPHA inflicting bodily harm, a laceration requiring stitches, on a domesticated animal. The animals known as: "Alpha: Lab/Husky Mix, Brown, Male, N+, L+2026, R+ 2028" is being declared as Dangerous Animal for the City of Appleton.

**CONTACT WITH KENYA WILSON 10/6/1999**

I then made contact with Kenya via a phone call. I introduced myself to Kenya and explained to her the reason for my phone call. It was explained to her that ALPHA would be declared as a dangerous animal for the City of Appleton. I explained the ordinances that go with this declaration and explained the appeal process to Kenya. Kenya was emailed a signed copy of the Dangerous Animal Declaration of ALPHA as with a copy of the ordinances that go with it. I asked Kenya if she had any questions in regards to this declaration or appeal process and she did not have any at the time. Kenya was able to sign the copy I sent her via email and sent it back to me. It has been uploaded to evidence.com A copy of this Declaration and Order was also email to the Health Department.

**Requirements for Harboring a Dangerous Animal in the City of Appleton (Sec. 3-132)**

(a)(3) **Indoor Confinement.** No dangerous animal may be kept on a porch, patio or in any part of a house or structure on the premises of the owner or caretaker that would allow the animal to exit the building on its own volition. No dangerous animal may be kept in a house or structure when the windows are open or when screen windows or screen doors are the only obstacle preventing the animal from exiting the structure.

(e) **Signs.** The owner or caretaker of a dangerous animal shall display, in prominent places on his or her premises near all entrances to the premises, signs in letters of not less than two (2) inches high warning that there is a dangerous animal on the property. A similar sign is required to be posted on the kennel or pen of the animal. In addition, the owner or caretaker shall conspicuously display a sign with a symbol warning children of the presence of a dangerous animal.

(f) **Spay and neuter requirement.** Within thirty (30) days after an animal has been designated dangerous, the owner or caretaker of the animal shall provide written proof from a licensed veterinarian that the animal has been spayed or neutered.

(g) **Liability insurance.** The owner or caretaker of a dangerous animal shall present to the Health Officer or Humane Officer a certificate of insurance that the owner or caretaker has procured liability insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 for any personal injuries inflicted by the dangerous animal. Whenever such policy is cancelled or not renewed, the insurer and animal's owner or caretaker shall notify the Health Officer or Humane Officer of such cancellation or non renewal in writing by certified mail.

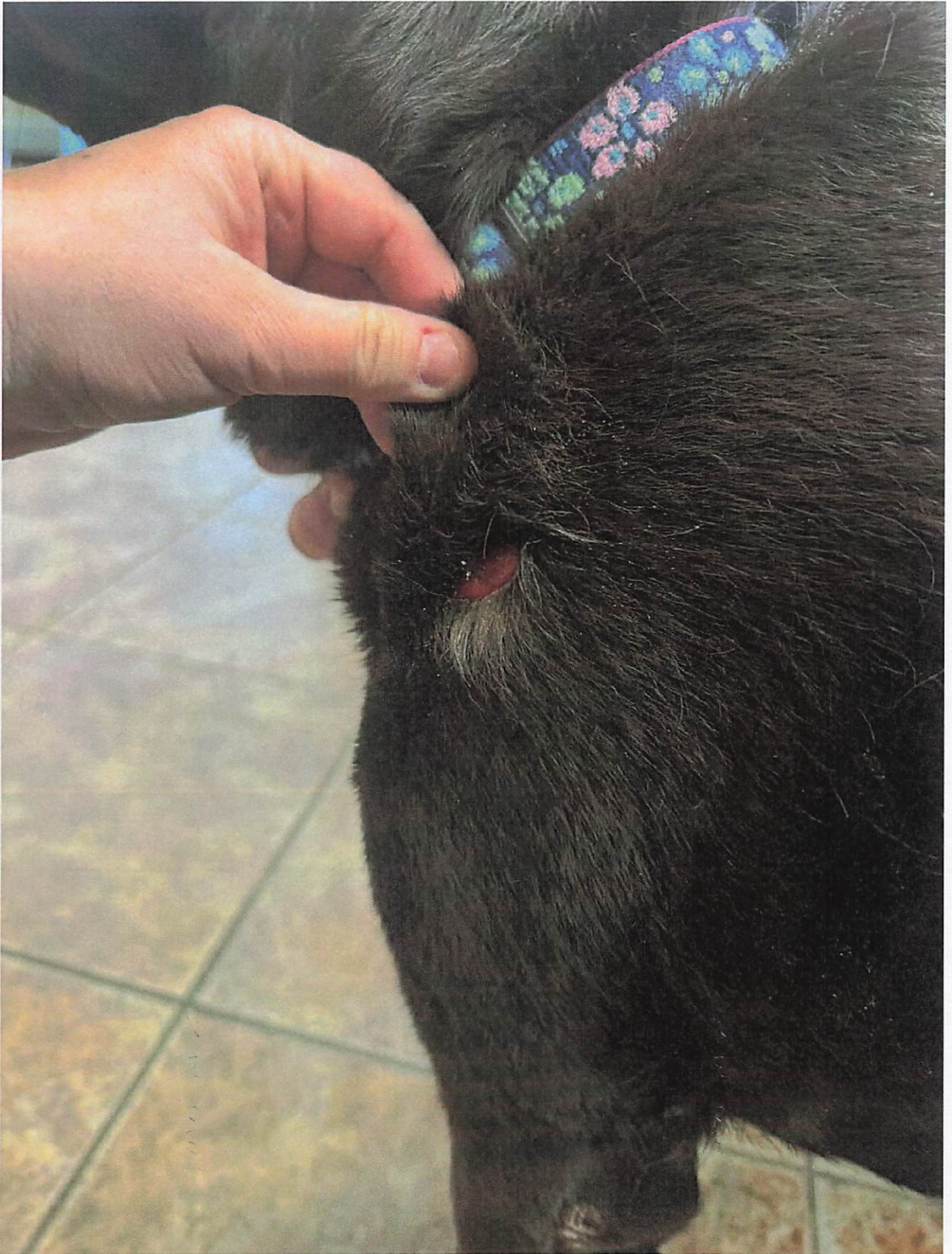
(h) **Waiver by Board of Health.** Upon request, by the owner or caretaker, the Board of Health may waive any requirement specified in subsections (a) through (g) that is deemed to be inappropriate for a particular dangerous animal.

(i) **Notification.** The owner or caretaker shall notify the police department within twenty-four (24) hours if a dangerous animal is at large, is unconfined, has attacked another animal or has attacked a human being or has died. No person may sell or transfer possession of a dangerous animal to another person without first notifying the person to whom the dangerous animal is being sold or transferred of the fact that such animal is a dangerous animal and of any requirements imposed upon the selling or transferring party by this division. No person may sell or transfer possession of a dangerous animal to another person, agency, organization or the like without first notifying the Police Department in writing, at least three (3) days in advance of the sale or transfer of possession with the name, address and telephone number of the new owner of the dangerous animal. If the dangerous animal is sold or given away to a person residing outside the city, the owner or caretaker shall present evidence to the Police Department showing that he or she has notified the Police Department, or other law enforcement agency of

the animal's new residence, including the name, address and telephone number of the new owner of the dangerous animal.

(j) Euthanasia. If the owner or caretaker of an animal that has been designated a dangerous animal is unwilling or unable to comply with the regulations for keeping the animal in accordance with this section, he or she may have the animal humanely euthanized by an animal shelter, the humane society or a licensed veterinarian.

(k) Waiver. The Health Officer may waive the provisions of subsections (b) to (g) for a law enforcement or military animal upon presentation by the animal's owner or handler of satisfactory arrangement for safe keeping of the animal.
